STATE NEWS.

Laurinburg Exchange: Mr. Nash LeGrand, brother of Mr. J. T. LeGrand, died at the home of his brother in Rockingham last Sunday after a protracted illness. He was one of the leading farmers of the Pee Dee river section of our county.

Lenoir Topic: When the Democratic primary was held in Cove Creek township, Watauga county, very few Alliance men attended it, but on the next Friday the sub-Alliance met and nominated a full county ticket for Watauga county. This foolish act was the very essence of ring-rule in which the sub-Alliance of Cove Creek assumed to dictate to the whole county. We suppose that the nominees will all decline.

Greensboro Workman: One of the most expeditious as well as highly important movements in railroad circles has been accomplished by the extension of the N. W. N. C. Railroad from Winston to Wilkesboro, just now effected and which was signaled on Saturday last by the handing over to Col. Andrews of the \$100,000 in Wilkes county bonds which the county had guaranteed to pay over on the completion of the road.

Wilson Mirror: There was recently born at Benson, in Johnston county, a white child which is pronounced to be one of the most wonderful freaks of nature ever seen in North Carolina, or perhaps in the world. The child lived fifty hours. It had two heads, one at each end of the body. The heads were perfectly formed in every particular and each nursed and cried. The child was 22 inches long and 18 inches wide with arms extended. It had three feet—two on one side and three on the other, and four arms, two on each side.

Raleigh News and Observer: The Republican revolt against Congressman Brower in the Fifth district is greater than the Democrats throughout the State generally suppose. It is so deep seated that the Winston Republican is out in a strong article against him and calling upon self-respecting Republicans not to support him. It charges him with betraying his party by voting for the Mills bill; being willing to turn traitor to his party in its hour of need, as evidenced by the interviews published indicating his willingness to be a candidate for Speaker of the House; and by raising school in the district by reason of his control of Federal appointments.

Charlotte News: The office of the Western Union Telegraph Company in this city is now adorned by a large size photograph of the operators, ten in number. Mr. William Lockhart was found dead in bed at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Peter McGowan, this morning. Mr. Lockhart had been confined to his bed for five years past, by an infirmity of some peculiar nature, yet through all that time he had a good appetite, and at his death he weighed 250 pounds. At 3 o'clock this morning he grew worse, and called his daughter, who remained with him until after daylight, when she went out to look after breakfast, leaving him apparently comfortable. When she went to his room shortly afterwards, she found him dead.
