The Chicago Journal is very much disgruntled because the Democrats of the First and Fourth Congressional Districts of Illinois have nominated W. G. Ewing and General W. C. Newberry as their respective candidates. It thinks that it was an outrage upon the Republican party to nominate such good men. "There is danger," says the Journal, "that the Republicans may lose control of the House through the disposition of non-partisan Republicans to vote for excellent Democratic candidates when presented."

Mr. Halstead, who earnestly opposes the passage of the force bill, in the Brooklyn Standard-Union, Rep., makes this interesting statement: "It is not a measure upon which the Republican army can be relied to carry the Democratic strongholds. The leading Republicans in Washington know this and admit it, and I say leading men, meaning very distinguished Senators and Representatives, of whose judgment I have information that comes from them. There is no confidence in the Lodge bill, whether as a law if it should be passed, or as an issue whether it is passed or not."

"But while in Mexico on my last trip," says a drummer in the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, "I had my breath taken away when I saw what I guess is the most magnificently constructed railroad in the world. I refer to the Mexican Gulf Road, where ties are made out of the finest mahogany and bridges built out of marble. The waste seems criminal, but the builders are actuated by motives of economy, as they find the mahogany and marble along the track side. The road hasn't really cost much to construct it, but if the materials were appraised at St. Louis and New York standard of prices the total would mount up in the millions."

Political leaders in New York are looking forward with no little anxiety to the next election. The new ballot reform law goes into force, and they are puzzled as to its effect on themselves and their parties. Some of these believe the new order of voting will keep many of the uninformed from the polls; others think that the vote will be much larger than in previous years. The redistricting of New York city has reduced the number of election districts from 1,019 to 947. This will also give more work to the district "statemen." Each district has been reconstructed so that its number of voters will not exceed 300. Formerly the number varied from 56 to 400.

In the years 1879-1889 there were 2,759 duels in Italy, 2,489 of which were fought with swords, 179 with pistols, 90 with daggers and with revolvers. Fifty duels resulted fatally, 1,060 in severe wounds and 2,541 in mere scratches. Nine hundred and seventy four duels were caused by newspaper and literary quarrels, 359 by political differences, 183 by secret dissensions, 273 by premeditated insults, 29 by religious discussions, 19 by trouble at games and 162 by unknown causes. The greatest number of duels was fought in August, 229, and the smallest in December, 82. In 1885, 165 of the principals were authors, 64 lawyers, 156 officers, 14 deputies, 14 professors, and the rest bankers, judges and one singer.
