**STATE NEWS.**

**Goldboro Dispatch:** The announcement that Rev. Dr. Black, of Raleigh, had been appointed Superintendent of the Oxford Orphan Asylum was premature. The Board has not yet met to elect a Superintendent, nor has a meeting been called.

**Monroe Register:** Mr. J. P. Rogers brought into our office a stalk of cotton six feet high. He informs us that he has an acre which will average nearly that high. On this acre Mr. Rogers has several time made a bale of cotton, and he thinks he will get 2,000 pounds off this one acre this year.

**Wadesboro Messenger:** The Methodists of Wadesboro are to have a new church. They already have in cash and good subscriptions about \$3,000. Their old church property is worth at least \$1,000, making \$4,000 now available. The church will be erected on the old Buck Tavern lot, which has been the property of the Methodists for some time.

**Charlotte News:** A letter received in this city yesterday from an authoritative source says that the congressional nomination in the Eighth District has already been won over Congressman Cowles by Major Graham, beyond any doubt. Mr. Cy Long, who is rustiating in Union county, writes that they have had splendid rains in Union and crops are looking fine. The blossoms are dropping off a little up in the red clay section, but elsewhere cotton is all that could be desired.

**Goldboro Argus:** There was a great Democratic mass meeting in Kenansville on Tuesday and Senator Vance was unanimously endorsed. The crops throughout this section are excellent, especially the corn crop. Some of our farmers say this will be the biggest crop that has been since 1840. For the month of July there were but eight deaths in Goldboro. Of these six were white and two were colored. Four were adults and four were children. The fox hunters were out in force yesterday morning with the Arlington-Gregory pack of dogs.

**Fayetteville Observer:** Rev. A. G. Emmerson, a native of Chatham county, this State, and a graduate of Wake Forest College, and brother-in-law to our townsman, J. B. Underwood, Esq., has just been elected President of Howard Payne College, Brownwood, Texas. For many years Mr. Emmerson has successfully and satisfactorily filled a professorship in William Jewell College, Liberty, Mo. He left North Carolina about the year 1870, and was at one time owner of the extensive Ore Hill mineral property, including the celebrated Mt. Vernon Springs.
