The Tabernacle

The large tabernacle building which is to be erected for the Sam Jones meetings is to be located on the corner of Seventh and Campbell streets, near Messrs. Fore & Foster's mill. It is to be 120x200 feet and will accommodate 7,000 persons. The location is a good one, near the railroad and the street car line and easily accessible to all. It is especially adapted to the convenience of those residing North of the W. & W. R. R. who can reach it by Sixth street bridge. The contract has been awarded to Mr. J. C. Stout and work will be commenced at an early date.

All Gone Home.

The soldiers have all gone home. Camp was broken at 7 o'clock this morning and the line of march taken up for the depot. The troops went directly through to their destinations on the morning trains on the W. & W. R. R., the C. C. R. R. and C. F. & Y. V. R. R. It has been a very pleasant and a very successful encampment and we have not heard an expression of dissatisfaction from any one. They all hope to be here again next year, when, if the military authorities take counsel with this year's experience, all of the troops will be in camp together and when it is expected that the new grounds at Summer Rest will be fully ready for them.

James Harris was bound over to the Criminal Court in the sum of \$100, justified bond, and was duly committed for trial in default of furnishing the bond, and Thaddeus Hurst was discharged. The witnesses were recognized for their appearance at court. David Hawkins, the wounded man, will soon be well again.

Before the Wind.

Capt. Chichester, who arrived here on the steamship Delaware to-day, from New York, reports having passed a great many vessels, about fifty in number, between Hatteras and Cape Fear, and he thinks that some of them are bound here. The large number is accounted for by the fact that coast-wise vessels, bound for Southern ports, have been detained for days past by head winds and as the wind is now favorable they are running directly before it and making good time toward their destined ports.

Nutt Street to be Paved.

A great deal of complaint has been made by merchants and others as to the condition of Nutt street, from Mulberry to the railroad yard and we understand that an appropriation has been made for the purpose by the Board of Aldermen, and approved by the Board of Audit and Finance, for paving that street with Belgian stone blocks and that the work will be done as soon as the Board of Health will allow dirt to be broken. The latter Board might safely give the permit now as there could hardly be any more danger to the health of the neighborhood by tearing up a foot of soil than there is now from sour mud and rotten, festering planks.

The German Celebration.

There was a good attendance at Luther Memorial Building last night at the meeting of German citizens called for the purpose of taking some action looking to an observance of the anniversary of the landing of the first Germans in America, and a great deal of interest was manifested by those who were present.

The following were appointed a committee on finance: Col. F. W. Kerchner, Capt. A. Adrian, and Messrs. Wm. Goodman, P. Heinsberger and Robert J. Katz, central committee, with the following sub-committee: Messrs. C. Schulken, M. Rathjen, F. W. Ortmann, J. W. Duls and J. G. Oldenbittel.

Remarks were made by Rev. F. W. E. Peschau, Col. F. W. Kerchner and Messrs. J. A. Bonitz, Sol Bear, W. H. Strauss, J. Snid, P. Heinsberger, Wm. Goodman, J. D. H. Klaunder, Geo. W. Bornemann and others.

On motion Mr. W. H. Strauss was added to the executive committee, in the place of Mr. F. Rheinsteint, who asked to be excused.

It was the sense of the meeting that the sum of \$2,000 be raised to defray the expenses of the celebration. The German military of Charleston and of Richmond are to be invited, and the Hon. Carl Schurz, of New York, is to be invited to become the orator for the occasion.

The meeting adjourned subject to a call from the executive committee.

Sam Jones in Norfolk.

We publish the following by request and it will be read with special interest in view of the fact that the date for Mr. Jones' appearance here is drawing on apace. It is from the pen of Rev. C. N. Donaldson, of Norfolk:

The Rev. Sam Jones closed a series of evangelistic meetings in this city last night of ten days' duration. I was glad of the opportunity of hearing him for myself. I missed hearing him once only, and regret that the tabernacle built for him seated about seven thousand. It was filled each night to overflowing, with two thousand standing without. Much of the time I was on the platform near him. I looked and listened attentively and sympathetically, and here is my honest, sincere conviction of the man and his work.

Sam Jones is the bravest and gentlest, most eloquent and consecrated minister of Jesus Christ I ever heard and his work the most thorough I have ever witnessed.

The powers of darkness in this city never received such a shock, and the kingdom of light more inspiration. I am not of those who would measure a man's power by visible or immediate results, but even these have been great, not less than one thousand souls being the estimate of those brought to Christ during these memorable ten days.

Sam Jones is the avowed enemy to sham, and every wicked way, and the loving advocate and friend of the true and good. God has given him to us and may He stand by him till his work is finished.

It was thrilling to see an audience last night of eight thousand rise to a man, and say—"Come back to our city a year hence!" One of our wealthy business men has offered one thousand dollars to erect a permanent building in the city provided Bro. Jones will hold meetings in it consecutively for five years. I hope it will come to pass. Darkened homes have been made happy; mothers rejoicing over the prodigal boy's return; many, very many, broken, hearted penitents have found the peace of God; pastors have felt the gridings of new power, and hundreds of wandering ones restored to the fold. Oh, that ministers and people would cease to criticize those who are trying to lift this fallen world to Heaven, and would themselves enter the conflict. At the last day, we may bitterly regret the stones we threw, but surely not the work and toil we gave to rescue poor publicans and sinners whom Christ died to save. Mr. Jones is a great preacher, measured by the profound convictions made by his preaching. He is intensely earnest, and this earnestness gives a charm even to his humor and sarcasm. The crowds laugh, but they weep as often, and after the laugh invariably there remains a practical truth. Underneath all, you feel the warmth of a great heart in love with men, and longing for their eternal freedom.

No man can criticize justly this wonderful man without hearing him; without hearing him consecutively till the close of his meetings. His first sermons are largely denunciatory, but when the great audience is awakened and moved he becomes pathetic and tender. This was true of Christ, of Peter, and of all the great reformers of the world. Turn to Peter's sermon before the throng on the day of Pentecost. It has two divisions: 1. A revelation of their awful guilt as the murderers of the Prince of Peace; 2. The offer of pardon on seeing their repentance. Here is the secret of all true preaching, and Jones has found it. Again no man can pass a just judgment on Mr. Jones who hears him in a spirit of prejudice and criticism, and not as a brother. Personally, I have nothing but love and blessings in my heart for him.

C., and I do enjoin all officers of the State and all good citizens to assist in bringing said criminal to justice.
