The Republicans of New Hanover county met in convention at the Court House at 10 o'clock this morning.

The convention was called to order by Jordan Nixon, temporary chairman, with J. W. Moseley as temporary secretary.

There were contesting delegations from the Second Ward but the committee on credentials appointed by the chair seated the VanAmringe delegation. W. H. Moore, Scott and Martin were therefore ruled out.

Mr. F. B. Rice was made permanent chairman and J. W. Moseley permanent secretary.

Four delegates for each township were appointed to the State, Congressional and Senatorial conventions.

Rev. Lucien Holmes died.

Rev. Lucien Holmes died at Charlotte on Wednesday and on Thursday his remains were interred.

Mr. Holmes was a priest in the Protestant Episcopal Church. The Charlotte papers speak of him as having been a native of Bladen county, but this is, we think, a mistake. We see sure that he was a native of Sampson. He practised law and taught school here about 40 years ago, but afterwards entered the ministry. He was an exceedingly handsome man, with a very pleasing address. He was here with his father, who was also a lawyer and had an office in the building corner Front and Princess streets, now occupied by Mr. I. Shrier. The elder Mr. Holmes was a frequent contributor to the columns of the Journal.

The Charlotte News of yesterday says: "The funeral services over the body of the late Rev. Lucien Holmes were conducted from St. Peter's Episcopal Church this morning, by Rev. Jos. B. Cheshire, assisted by Rev. E. A. Osborne, in the presence of a large and sympathetic audience. The deceased pastor was best known in Charlotte in connection with his educational work with Rev. Mr. Bronson. He was a philanthropist of no mean degree, and gave all his money to charitable purposes: The pall-bearers were: Capt. Thomas H. Houghton, Col. H. C. Jones, Capt. John Wilkes, Mr. P. D. Walker, Mr. Baxter Moore, Dr. J. M. Davidson and Mr. J. K. P. Neathery.

Keeping House With Cockroaches.

Beetles, water bugs, &c., is not pleasant.
