A New Postal.
The Postoffice Department has issued orders for samples of pearl gray postal card board, to be employed in the manufacture of postal cards for the use of women. The card is to be one-third smaller than that in use at present, and will probably be a much more dainty affair. It may not be large enough for an entire feminine epistle, but it may serve to write a second postscript on after the regular letter has been dispatched. Wilmington, Onslow and East Carolina Railroad.

This important enterprise is being pushed forward with a directness and energy, such as no one dreamed of twenty years ago, and if any one had predicted when the war closed that such a road would be built or even started within thirty years would have been deemed a visionary of the most pronounced type. However, "the world do move," and moves with rapid and gigantic strides in this Southern country.

The W., O. & E. C. R. R. has now 27 miles of track laid, and the extension of the line is now being pushed at the rate of half a mile of track-laying per day, and that there will be no diminution in the work may be well imagined from the fact that three large schooners laden with rails are expected to arrive daily.

The company has just ordered ten new flat cars, five box cars and one baggage and express combined, so that the needs of the people will be supplied as fast as the work progresses. It is a great work and will prove a great blessing to the people along its line and its vicinity.

Railroad Matters.
A special meeting of the stockholders of the Wilmington, Chadbourne & Conway Railroad was held at Chadbourne on the 28th of July last. All the stockholders, save three, were in attendance, making it the largest meeting since the organization of the company. The object of the meeting was to consider the advisability of extending the line of the road some ten miles, to a place where extensive saw mills are in course of construction, and it was decided, after careful consideration of the subject in all its bearings, that, although the "extension would necessitate increased equipments, the cost of running would not be materially larger, and the increase in business—passenger and freight—would be double what it now is. Consequently, the proposition was adopted with hardly a dissenting voice.

The managers of the road are gentlemen of the strictest integrity, keenest business sagacity and most resolute energy, who devote the severest scrutiny to all that pertains to its success, as well as to the needs of the people whom it brings in closer intimacy with the shipping markets of the country. We are glad to note the progress of the enterprise.
