They Met, Quarreled and Fought. John C. Koch, whose unfortunate difficulty with the late Joseph Ramsden resulted in the death of the latter, is in jail and will remain there until the Criminal Court meets next month. It was understood that Judge Meares might refuse to release him on bail and hence the application for a writ of habeas corpus was withdrawn.

It is a bailable offense, however, let who will say to the contrary, Judge Meares did not like, we presume, to go beyond the verdict of the jury, especially as the case would be tried in his court, but all the same we think that Koch is unjustly and improperly restrained of his liberty. Ramsden's injuries were the result of a street fight, participated in by both parties and in which no deadly weapons were used and it is likely that his death was as much the result of his own carelessness and imprudence and bad habits as it was of the injuries he received. No malice prepense has been proved and the fight was merely the result of a difference between the two on money matters. They met, quarreled and fought and that is all there is in it.

A Musical Memorial. The Birmingham Age-Herald publishes a very interesting description of an organ recently presented to the Judson Institute by that liberal-minded gentleman, Mr. Geo. C. Kelley, formerly of this city, as a tribute to the memory of his wife, who was not long ago removed from earth to higher and more beautiful and more enduring scenes than these. We copy from our contemporary the following report:

An interesting event at Marion on last Saturday was the opening of the new pipe organ at the Judson Institute—an event made possible by the munificence of Mr. George C. Kelley, of Birmingham, Ala., who donated the handsome instrument to the institution as a tribute to the memory of his wife, the late Mrs. Isoline Bates Kelley, she having been a graduate from the institute. Prof. Eugene L. Merriman, of Montgomery, gave an impromptu recital on the organ and creditably demonstrated its capacity for grand and varied effects in all the lights and shades of tone color.

The instrument is not only excellent in its musical qualities, but is pleasing to the eye from the artistic blending of form and color in its design. It most happily combines dignity and grace of form with a charming harmony of color. The Judson Institute is to be congratulated on the possession of the largest organ in any institution of learning in the United States.


