## The Monument to Col. Jones.

The monument to be erected over the grave of the late Col. L. C. Jones at Buffalo Church, by the employes of the Carolina Central Road, has been completed by the contractors, I. W. Durham & Co., of Charlotte, and was shipped to Jonesboro on Thursday. It is a very handsome shaft and cost \$500. It will stand as a memorial to one of the best citizens North Carolina ever had.

## A Grand Sight.

In consequence of the very heavy surf there was but little bathing at Ocean View yesterday afternoon and yet it was a grand sight to see the large waves making for the shore and the water frequently coming over the plank walk between the pavilion and the bath house, causing a beholder to remark: "Who can witness such a sight and doubt the existence of a Supreme Being?"

## Moonlight and music.

A grand moonlight excursion will be given to Carolina Beach on Monday evening, under the auspices of the well known Arion Quartette. The Grove will leave at 8 o'clock and return at 12 o'clock, and one of the delightful features of the evening will be a concert, on board by the Quartette. With such a night as this no more delightful an entertainment could be projected and we know that there will be large number on board.

## The Extension.

The line of the new extension of the Wilmington, Chadbourne & Conway Railroad is being located now and the surveyors expected to complete the work and have in their report this afternoon. Work is to begin on Monday and it will be pushed forward as fast as possible. The extension will be 10 1/2 miles in length, from Chadbourne to Butter's Mill, in Robeson county. Trains will in all probability be running through from Conway to Butter's Mill before October.

## And Thereby Hangs a Tail.

They chased that poor old fox up and down the sands of Wrightsville Beach last night and thought they were having a good time. ## Death of Capt. Pennypacker.

We greatly regret to chronicle the sudden and unexpected death of Capt. Enos J. Pennypacker, Collector of Customs at this port. He died last night at 10 o'clock, at his room in the Orton House, of heart disease.

For some months past Capt. Pennypacker has been in feeble health, but lately he had recovered sufficiently to attend at his office. It was apparent to his friends, however, that his health had been seriously shattered and they have feared a fatal result for some weeks past. He was on the streets yesterday and last night, while seated at the supper table in the Orton House, he suffered a severe attack. He was taken to his room and medical aid was summoned but all of the avails of science were useless.

Capt. Pennypacker was 54 years of age and had resided in this city ever since the year 1866. He was born in Chester, Pa., and served with gallantry and distinction during the war as a cavalry officer. He was wounded in the fight at Hagers town, Md. He first came here as U. S. supervisor of naval stores, afterwards owned a small steam saw mill in the Northern part of the city and still later, in company with some other gentlemen here, he organized and equipped the Champion Com press, of which, until a year ago, he was the Superintendent. At that time he disposed of his interest in that company and accepted the Presidency of the Wilmington Com press and Warehouse Co. He was appointed Collector of Customs by President Arthur and reappointed by President Harrison. For nearly twenty years past he has been the lessee of the Opera House here.

Capt. Pennypacker was unmarried and was the last of a family of twelve, all of whom died of the same disease, the dreaded *angina pectoris*. He had many excellencies of mind and heart and there is one universal expression of sorrow at his death. He was possessed of a kindly, generous nature and was charitable to a fault. At the same time he was a sturdy opponent in the political field and could give and take hard knocks with the same perfect equanimity. He had premonitions of his death several days since and on Tuesday last he called in Mr. A. G. Ricard, the lawyer, and dictated his last will and testament, appointing Mr. George Chadbourne, President of the First National Bank, as Executor under the will. The estate is valued at about \$40,000 and will probably go to relatives in Philadelphia, although of course the disposition of his effects is as yet unknown.

The remains were taken off this morning on the 9 o'clock train, for Philadelphia, where they will be interred.

Judge Russell, he thought, did not desire it, nor did he think Mr. Loekey would apply. General Manning, he remarked, "was out of it". Of Col. Canaday he did not speak. It is understood that the latter is now engaged in the pension business in Washington City and will probably not be an aspirant. Come to think of it, good Republican timber for such a position is rather scarce here now.

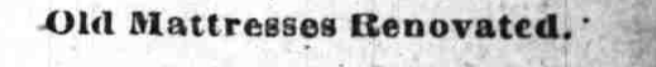

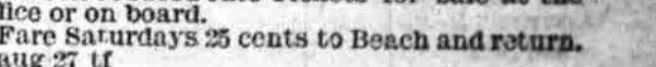
