A resident of Eliot, Me., which is close by Kittery, writes to the Portland Argus that the reason why Commodore Skerriit was displaced from the command of the Czar's navy yard was his refusal to sign false mutter rolls. The Czar's friends' "down Biddleford way," called for a commandant who would be in sympathy with them, a man, without unnecessary scruples of conscience such as would deter him from being servicable.

Russia is the leading grain exporting country of the world, the United States, India and Roumania following in the order named. Odessa is the leading grain exporting port of the Russian Empire, and may be considered as the principal business city. The export trade has for many years been almost exclusively in the hands of foreigners, and Odessa might equally well be called a French, German, Italian or even a Hebrew city, as far as the languages spoken or the characteristics of the inhabitants are considered.

Month cancers and cigar-smoking have been closely associated in the public mind since Gen. Grant's death, but a prominent Cincinnati physician, in a recent conversation upon the subject, said: "The only cases of cancer of the tongue I ever saw were of persons who never smoked. The majority of them were women, and the half dozen men who were afflicted were not confirmed smokers at all. I don't believe that smoking in the most indirect way causes cancer of the tongue. In Gen. Grant's case the public believed his disease was due to excessive smoking, but few physicians share that view."

The "grip," or epidemic influenza, says the *Illustrated American*, obligingly went all around the world and to all parts of it, in order that all medical men might have a good opportunity of studying it. Most medical men availed themselves of the chance, and they were helped in their investigations by large numbers of unclassified laymen. Yet an eminent physician is quoted as saying that had been done, nothing had been learned that had not been on record for centuries, especially in connection with the epidemics of 1519 and 1743.

"I know personally scores of farmers who have always voted the Republican ticket that will cast Democratic ballots this fall," said Mr. Martin P. Schafer, a talented young lawyer, of Belleville, Ill., to a Washington Post reporter. Mr. Schafer is prosecuting attorney for St. Clair county, and is regarded as one of the rising men of his section. The "reason," he continued, "of this change of sentiment is found in the tariff. I don't think the farmers of America can any longer be made to believe that a protective tariff benefits them in the slightest. They have stood by this policy and grown poorer and poorer. In our country they openly declare their intention of voting the other way hereafter."

A dispatch from Little Rock to the *New York Times* says: Eagle and Fizer are ministers of the Baptist and Methodist denominations, respectively. Eagle was chosen Governor in 1888 and was renominated by the Democratic Convention held here June 17. He has given the State a good administration. Fizer is presiding elder of the White River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and resides at Beebe. He is popular and a good debater. He was nominated by the Union Labor Convention of June 10, and endorsed by the Republican State Convention which met here June 9. The gubernatorial candidates have been making a

joint canvass of the State. Public feeling is running high, and the canvass has been worked with considerable turbulence. At Pine Bluff Governor Eagle, while speaking, was interrupted by negro rowdies and the meeting came near ending with a riot. Both parties claim the State. The friends of Governor Eagle say he will be elected by 20,000 majority, and the followers of Fizer claim that his majority will not be less than 10,000. It is estimated that the total vote will be over 200,000. On the eve of the close of the canvass the indication are favorable for the election of Eagle and the entire Democratic State ticket by from 5,000 to 10,000 majority.
