**Audit and Finance.**  
The Board of Audit and Finance at the regular meeting yesterday, at which Mr. R. J. Jones, chairman, Capt. W. R. Kenan and Mr. John W. Hewett were present, audited and approved bills for current expenses amounting to \$2,847.11. Three hundred and eighty coupons (\$103.80) matured before bonds were issued, were destroyed in the presence of the Board.

**Closed for the Season.**  
The Island Beach Hotel closed for the season yesterday. Mr. J. A. Brown, the lessee, has been very successful in its management this year, and his estimate is that the business done by the house has been double that of any preceding year. He has kept a good house and has met much merited commendation. More room is needed at the hotel, however as there were occasions during a part of the season when double the amount of accommodation was needed to meet the demand.

**Arrival of Bishop Galloway.**  
Bishop Charles B. Galloway, of the Methodist E. Church South, arrived in the city this morning from Goldsboro, where he dedicated St. Paul Methodist church last Sunday evening. He was accompanied by his relative, Capt. A. J. Galloway. While in the city the Bishop will be the guest of Col. Roger Moore, on Chestnut, between North Front and Second streets. He will preach to-night at 8 o'clock at Grace Methodist church. Strangers and visitors are cordially invited to attend the services.

**Squirrels and Alligators.**  
Messrs. G. C. Hewlett and F. P. Risley hunted yesterday at Maulsby Point, on Black River. They got 50 squirrels and an alligator. They brought the squirrels home with them and left the alligator. They say the latter was 33 feet long and 8 feet broad—more or less—and that they shot him in the back of the head and he then sank. We have no more doubt about the latter than as to his size. He must certainly have sunk—alligators generally do when they dive.

This reminds the reporter of an incident in his experience. He was at Southport in the Summer of 1882 when an alligator seven or eight feet long was seen in the river near one of the wharves. He was shot at six times with a powerful Colt's revolver and was then harpooned and drawn ashore. He was struck on the head with an axe and his head split open, and then an attempt was made to prize his mouth open with the blade of the axe, when he seized it in his teeth and actually bit a large piece out of the hard metal.

**Criminal Court.**  
In this court, yesterday afternoon, the trial of John Koch, indicted for the murder of Jos. Ramsden, was fixed for Monday next and a venire of 70 men was ordered, from which to select a jury. Messrs. M. Bellamy and A. J. Marshall will appear for the prisoner and Col. Moore, the Solicitor, for the State.

The grand jury, late in the afternoon, returned a true bill against Charles Maynor, colored, indicted for the murder of the late Nathan Falls. Defendant was arraigned this morning and the case was set for trial on Friday next, at 10 a. m. The counsel for the defence are Hon. A. M. Waddell and Messrs. Iredell Meares and P. B. Manning.

The following cases were disposed of to-day:  
State vs. Jno. A. Barker, for perjury. Argument for removal made by counsel, Messrs. Russel & Ricard and Bruce Williams, and denied by the court. Case set for trial to-morrow.

State vs. Dennis Horne, for assault and battery. On trial at our close. The grand jury found true bills to-day against Maggie Parker, for larceny; P. Gause, for assault and battery, and Stephen Graham, for false pretences. Not a true bill was found in the case of Gaston Solomon, indicted for larceny.

**Taken Very Suddenly.**  
Mr. H. C. Prempert was taken suddenly very ill this morning, at 7 o'clock, at his place of business on South Front street, and was conveyed to his rooms, corner Front and Dock streets. Dr. Potter was called in and ascertained that the sickness was due to heart failure. He remained unconscious all of the forenoon but this afternoon there was a rally and about 4 o'clock he was pronounced as somewhat better. We sincerely trust that he may recover. He is a very worthy gentleman, highly esteemed by all who know him and an additional claim to our regard lies in the fact that he was a gallant Confederate soldier. We hope to be able to chronicle his complete recovery in a few days.

**The Marionettes.**  
A crowded house was present last night at the Opera House to welcome Prof. Bell's Marionettes on their third annual visit to our city. The entertainment was a very fine one, a number of new and pleasing features having been added since their last visit here, notably the canary birds, the pictures in the clouds and the musical glasses. The audience was enthusiastic and delighted with the performance. At the close of the entertainment a number of hand some presents were given out. A. J. Shepard, No. 27 Market street, received a dinner set of over 100 pieces; E. Knight, 825 North Fourth street, a blue bed-room set of twelve pieces; Mrs. R. A. Montgomery, Brunswick county, a bed-room set of ten pieces; Miss Emma Hansley, Queen street, a large plush album; Miss Lula Gurganus, Queen street, a large gold plush album stand.

To-night will be given as leading presents a ton of anthracite coal; a dinner set of one hundred and fifty-six pieces; a tea set of fifty-six pieces; a bed-room set of twelve pieces, a pair of large studio lamps, and two large plush stand albums.

The prices of admission will be for the first two rows of seats in the dress circle up stairs and the four back rows of chairs in the parquette, 35 cents with two envelopes; all other seats in the parquette, 50 cents with three envelopes. All seats can be reserved without extra charge at Yates' book store.

**The Big Tabernacle.**  
The publication by us yesterday of estimates made by a friend of ours, and handed in to us, of the seating capacity of the new Sam Jones tabernacle building, has called forth a vigorous protest from the committee. These gentlemen have not only made careful measurements as to the capacities of the building but have tested their estimates practically. They assert that the tabernacle will hold 7,108 persons, exclusive of the aisles, which afford room for several hundred more seats. They have measured the seats and by allowing the proper width to each person have thus arrived at a careful estimate. To verify this they have filled a bench with people seated thereon and have in this way tested and proved their estimates. The hall proper will seat 7,108 persons, with room for 300 on the platform and with the aisles bare. The most conservative estimate made up by the committee is that 6,800 persons can be seated easily and without any crowding of the benches and that with a little closing up 800 more can be accommodated.

The building, which was erected by Mr. J. C. Stout, the contractor, is said to be one of the most solid and substantial of its kind, especial care having been used in its construction looking to the means of ingress and egress.

There is no doubt of the fact that there will be an immense number of people here to hear Mr. Jones. There will be a big demand for accommodations and it is probable that private households will be called upon to accommodate the guests. The country people should send in supplies freely as there will be a big demand for them during the period of the meetings.
