The reappearance of Flanigan as the Republican nominee for Governor in Texas moves the Philadelphia Telegraph to unwonted flippancy. It says: "The great advocate of the spoils system in politics will now find out 'what he is here for' if there is anything left of him after the polls close in November next. If there remains enough of Flanigan to survive till 1892 he will doubtless turn up in the next Republican National Convention a 'big' personage than ever. A man who can run for Governor as a Republican candidate in Texas is sure to be more or less of a curiosity among politicians wherever he may go."

Returns that have been made to Parliament show that there are in Great Britain and Ireland 3,800 miles of inland navigation, of which 1,000 miles are on open rivers, leaving 2,800 miles of canals, the greater part of which are in England. Although the canal business has been greatly neglected since railroads have become so numerous, yet many English canals still pay large dividends; and at an international congress on inland navigation, which was recently held in Manchester, there was evidence of a disposition to revive canal activity. The Manchester Ship Canal, which when completed promises to revolutionize the English cotton trade, is undoubtedly a strong factor in the new movement.

The St. Louis Republic says that the Republican press is congratulating the farmers on the drought as if it were not only a blessing but a special dispensation secured from Providence in the line of the Republican policy of artificial scarcity, increased want and high prices. It adds: "The farmer who gets more for his one hundred bushels of grain because his neighbor's crop was dried up by the drought is called on by the Republican party to turn it over to the plutocracy. Whether the crops are abundant or a failure the plutocracy gets the benefit of it under the absurd and unnatural laws by which Republicanism checks the supply and prevents the free distribution of the manufactured necessities and comforts of life."

The Chesapeake and Ohio Canal is for sale to the highest bidder. Until it was practically destroyed by floods a few years ago, this canal was largely used to transport merchandise from Cumberland, Md., to Alexandria, Va. Lately this canal has been in the hands of receivers, who have decided that it cannot be repaired except at unreasonable cost, and could not then be operated at a profit. Nominally owned by a corporation, but really held by bondholders, their inability to operate it left no resource open but a sale, and to this sale the State and the corporation consented. The bondholders only objected, but the Supreme Court of Maryland has now ordered the sale subject to the approval of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia. Possibly the bank of the canal may be used as a railroad bed, and portions of the canal itself are valuable as water-power, but as a canal its days seem ended.

An Irish paper speaks of a touching incident at the banquet given in London recently to Mr. Parnell: "For months The O'Gorman Mahon, who was in political warfare when Mr. Gladstone was still at Christ Church, and who looks down on the Liberal leader as a vicious young schoolboy, had been sick almost to death. Many of his friends thought that they would never look again on the leonine face of the grand old swordsman, who had a word and a blow for

every slanderer of Ireland in the long dead past. But to the surprise of everybody—just as dinner was about to be announced—that splendid and towering figure, dressed, not in the commonplace swallow-tail, but in a strange woolly garment, with sleeves tucked up and the look of many years' wear, walked into the room. At once there burst out a murmur, then it rose to a cheer, and then man after man went up to cordially shake the grand old chieftain's hand. It was a historic moment."
