The New Registration.
The law requires that a new registration of the voters be made this year. Every person entitled to vote must register. Under the act the registration books will be open to-morrow. They are not to be open on Sundays. The attention of registrars is particularly directed to this provision of the act.

Criminal Court.

Late yesterday afternoon the case of the State vs. John A. Barker was given to the jury and then the docket was resumed and the following cases were disposed of:

State vs. William Sheppard and Thomas Day, affray. Defendant Sheppard submitted and was made a State's witness. A verdict of guilty was found as to defendant Day. The defendants were each fined \$5 and the costs.

State vs. Cesar Hall, assault with a deadly weapon. Verdict guilty. Judgment suspended upon payment of costs and defendant, recognized in the sum of \$50 for his appearance at the November term.

State vs. Jacob Joslyn and Simon Holmes, colored, larceny. Verdict guilty. Defendants sentenced to 12 months in the State penitentiary.

State vs. Archie McLean, colored, larceny. Verdict guilty. Prisoner sentenced to 12 months in the penitentiary.

State vs. Stephen H. Anderson, colored, larceny. Verdict guilty. Prisoner sentenced to 12 months in the State penitentiary.

State vs. Dennis Horne, for larceny. This case was disposed of on Tuesday but sentence was not then pronounced. Defendant was brought into court to-day and find \$25 and costs.

State vs. Chas. Maynor, for murder. Continued for State to the November term.

State vs. David Hawkins and Joseph Harris, for an affray. Verdict, guilty.

State vs. Julia Ann McBryde, for an affray. Defendant submits.

State vs. Maggie Parker, for larceny. Defendant submits. Judgment suspended on payment of costs.

The case of John A. Barker, for perjury, was given to the jury yesterday afternoon, at 6 o'clock. They remained out all night, having been unable to agree, and have been out all day. At 4 o'clock no verdict in the case had been reached.

The New Registration.
The registration books will be opened to-morrow from 9 a. m. to 2 p. m. and from 3.30 p. m. to sunset. Some Republicans complain of tyranny and oppression under the laws, a complaint which is absolutely without any foundation whatever. It is simply designed to prevent fraud—and probably that's what's the matter with the Republican Hannahs—and about the only change in the law is to demand more detailed information about the voter for purposes of identification and to prevent fraud.

The following carefully prepared synopsis shows just what the law as it stands on the statute books:

1. First there must be an entirely new registration of voters, the County Commissioners having so ordered, and no man can vote at the coming election if his name is not on the new registration books. No matter how many times he may have registered previously he must register again or he cannot vote.

2. The voter shall give, and the registration books shall show, as near as may be, the age, occupation, place of birth and place of residence, and also the full name of the voter, and in the case of removal, the township or county from which he has removed.

3. The registration books shall be kept open for registration from sunrise to sunset each day, except Sundays, from the 20th day of September, inclusive, and no registration will be allowed after the last named day, unless the voter shall have become qualified, by becoming of age, since the closing of the registration books as above provided.

4. On Saturday, October 25, 1890, it shall be the duty of the registrars and judges of election to attend at the polling places of their township, or precinct, with the registration books, from 9 a. m. till 5 p. m., when and where the registration books shall be open to the inspection of the voters, and objections to voters shall then be made, and the word "challenged" noted on the books, and a time and place before election day shall be appointed to hear such challenges, upon giving notice to the person challenged. But such challenges may be made at any time.

5. All male persons, twenty one years old and upwards, (not being idiots or lunatics, or having been convicted of an infamous crime com-

mitted after January 1, 1877, and not having been legally restored to rights of citizenship) born in the United States, and who have legally naturalized, who shall have resided in the State twelve months next preceding the election and 90 days in the county in which he proposes to vote, shall be entitled to vote.

The residence of a married man shall be where his family resides, and that of a single man where he boards and sleeps, and should he stay in one precinct and board in another, his residence shall be where he sleeps.

And if an elector has previously been registered in any ward, precinct or township in the country, he shall not be allowed to register again, until he procures a certificate of the registrar of the former township, ward or precinct, that he has removed from the same, and that his name has been erased from the registration books of said ward, township or precinct.
