### Cotton.

The receipts of cotton at this port for the week ending with yesterday foot up 12,009 bales, as against 4,698 bales for the corresponding week of last year, an increase of 7,371 bales. The receipts of the crop year to date foot up 24,436 bales, against 5,887 bales to same date last year, an in-crease this year of 18,549 bales, more than 400 per cent.

Prof. McCarthy has made a spe-cialty of the study of fungous dis-eases of grape vines and fruit trees, and will be pleased to meet all persons in-terested in fruit growing in the Mayor's office at the City Hall at 4 o'clock p. m. next Tuesday, when he will deliver a lecture on the subject mentioned above, and suggest reme-dies for the more dangerous diseases to which fruit trees, etc., are liable.

### Criminal Court.

The court was occupied this fore-noon with the Barker perjury case. The jury came into court yesterday afternoon, at 5:30 o'clock, and ren-dered a verdict of guilty. Along the C. F. & Y. V. R. R.—Fine Crop Prospects—The Road and Its Man-agement—Politics and Predictions, &c., &c. (Sp. Corr. Daily Review.)

MT. AIRY, N. C., Sept. 17, 1890.

It may not be amiss to drop a few lines relative to the progress of this most flourishing mountain town, to-gether with a sketch from Greens-boro to Mt. Airy. Your correspon-dent left Greensboro on Monday evening last and kept an eye to the improvements along the route. All the stations along the line of the C. F. & Y. V. R. R. are fast growing up, and in a few more years many good-sized towns will be seen along this route, under the skillful man-agement of this road. President Julius A. Gray, and the General Manager, J. W. Fry, who are rail-road men of the right stripe, and are looking continuously to the building up of their road and the towns along the same. The Roanoke & South-ern Railroad, crossing the C. F. & Y. V. Railroad at Walnut Cove, has given that flourishing little town quite a boom. It is really a very de-sirable and beautiful location for a summer residence for Eastern people.

There is no spot in North Caro-lina which can compare to this place as a quiet summer resort. It is high up in the mountains, with a scenery unsurpassed, and in full view of the celebrated Pilot Mountain. The hotels are all well kept, particularly "The Central," at which I am stop-ping.
