Mr. James H. Chadbourn, Jr., has returned from a business trip to Baltimore, made in the interest of his road, the W. C. & C. R. R.

Mr. Russell Bellamy, son of Dr. W. J. H. Bellamy, has gone to New York to attend lectures in the medical department of the University of the City of New York.

This has been one of the most uncomfortable days we have had this month. It has been as warm as a July day and the atmosphere has been loaded with humidity.

We are requested to state that the cutting scrape on Sunday last did not occur on the Seacoast train at Wrightsville, as has been stated (not by us) but on the beach.

The Purcell House cafe had the first oysters of the season. They got in a lot of Lynnhaven Bay oysters last evening and by 10 o'clock last night every one had been sold. They will try it over again.

The C. F. & Y. V. Railroad will give cheap rates to the Sam Jones meetings in Wilmington. Excursion tickets will be on sale from Sept. 25th to Oct. 6th. On next Saturday a special excursion train will be run from Mt. Airy to Wilmington and return on Monday.

The Hettie Bernard Chase Comedy Co. play at Durham to-night. They have cancelled their dates here for the 29th and 30th. It seems to have been a mutual agreement. The next thing on the boards is the "Colored Aristocracy," due here next Monday week, October 6th.

The Sam Jones choir will practice to-night at 8 o'clock in the lecture room of Grace M. E. Church; but to-morrow (Wednesday) night the practice will be at the Tabernacle immediately after the close of the prayer meeting to be held there that evening.

The Republicans in Wilmington are not agreed as to the next Presidential candidate. It is said to be a fact that assurances have gone from this city that North Carolina will support Blaine in the next convention, that she will support Harrison, will support Reed and will support John Sherman.

Mr. John F. Garrell has recently returned to the city from the Western part of the State where he went to make arrangements for full supplies of fine mountain beef during the Sam Jones meetings. He succeeded and has already received the first carloads. It is fine beef and will be on his stalls every day now for weeks to come.

Mr. F. Woolven, representing the Baldwin Locomotive Works, is here for the purpose of having an interview with Capt. Nolan, General Manager of the Seacoast R. R., relative to some details as to the construction of the new and powerful engine ordered by that road, which is to be delivered here next March, in full time for next season's traffic.

The W. O. & E. C. R. R. will offer special inducements to the people of Pender and Onslow counties, along the line of that road, to attend the meetings to be held in the tabernacle by Rev. Sam Jones. The material train, with passenger coaches attached, will be run twice each day, morning and afternoon, and reduced rates, equivalent to those on other roads, will be allowed. Yom Kippur.
Yom Kippur, the Hebrew Day of Atonement, begins at sunset this evening and closes at sunset to-morrow evening, during which time not one drop of food or drink passes the mouth. It is therefore a strict fast and is so kept by every one of the Jewish race. It is the most holy and important day in their calendar and all business is suspended during the fast. The stores will all be closed at sunset this evening and remain closed until the same time to-morrow evening.

The Seacoast Schedule.

The Wilmington Seacoast Railroad will run the following schedule during Mr. Jones' meetings here: Leave Hammocks at 7.40 and 10.25 a. m., 4.30 and 6.20 p. m. Leave Wilmington at 9.30 a. m., 2.30, 5.30 and 10.30 p. m. The last train will leave after the close of the services at night, 10.30 or later. Tickets for the round trip on the 10.30 p. m. train will be 25 cents, good to return next day.

Services at the Tabernacle.

The regular Wednesday night prayer meeting of Grace M. E. Church (instead of being held in the Lecture Room as announced Sunday night) will be held at the Tabernacle, on Seventh and Campbell streets. All who are interested in the approaching meetings at the Tabernacle are cordially invited to be present. At the close of the prayer meeting choir practice will be held.

The Collectorship.

Judge Russell seems to be coming to the front very prominently as the possible future collector at this port. We were told to-day by one who knows that if he declares for it he can get it, but that he has not yet said that he wants it. The list of candidates seems to have narrowed down to Mr. Chadbourn, Judge Russell and Mr. Geo. Z. French. It is the opinion of many that the appointment will be made in a few days now, not later than the first of October.

Accommodations on the Coast.

We understand that accommodations may be had at Wrightsville and the Hammocks, for parties visiting the city during the Sam Jones services. Capt. Manning and Mr. Stokley will both accommodate boarders. The only additional cost will be 25 cents a day for a ticket on the Seacoast Railroad, Capt. Nolan having established this rate for round trip tickets by the last train.

Filling in the Trestle.

The work of filling in the trestle on the Seacoast R. R. across the Sound is progressing satisfactorily. About 100 yards running out from the Hammocks have been filled up solid with the track and turfed on the sides. The intention at present, however, is not to fill it entirely all of the way across, but only about half-way up, so as to preserve the timbers. This work is to be done this Fall and Winter and next Fall it is to be carried on and it is expected to complete the filling in then.

Pushing Ahead.

About 33 miles of the W. O. & E. C. R. R. has been completed and several miles more of track will probably be laid by the latter part of this week, or early next week. The road will run within a mile and a half of Stone's Bay, on New River, and near its mouth, thus ensuring a large traffic in oysters and fish. From there it strikes out for Jacksonville, skirting a large swamp on the riverside distance above Stone's Bay. The management confidently expects to enter Jacksonville by the latter part of October. The run now is about 30 miles from the city and a good traffic, in both passenger and freight, already passes over the line.

The Criminal Court.

The Koch murder case was not given to the jury at all. The taking of testimony was concluded, to-day about half-past 1 o'clock, when a consultation was had between the Solicitor and the counsel for the defense and a verdict of manslaughter was agreed upon. Sentence will be pronounced to-morrow morning.

The River and Harbor Bill.

The U. S. Engineer office of this city, now under the charge of Lt. Mason M. Patrick—during Captain Bixby's sickness, has just received notice from the Chief of Engineers, U. S. A., at Washington, D. C., that the River and Harbor Act recently passed by Congress appropriates the following amounts for North and South Carolina waterways in the Wilmington District:

Improving harbor at Beaufort, N. C., \$15,000; improving the inland waterway between Beaufort and New River, N. C., \$15,000; improving harbor at Georgetown, S. C., \$8,000; improving Winyaw Bay, S. C., \$100,000; improving Cape Fear river, N. C., above Wilmington, \$15,000; improving Cape Fear river, at and below Wilmington, N. C., \$170,000; improving Contentna Creek, N. C., \$7,000; improving Neuse River, N. C., \$20,000; improving New River, N. C., \$5,000; improving Pamlico and Tar rivers, N. C., \$10,000; improving Trent river, N. C., \$5,000; improving Roanoke river, N. C., \$25,000; improving Yadkin river, N. C., \$5,000; improving Ocracoke Inlet, N. C., \$90,000; improving Mackey's Creek, N. C., \$15,000; improving North East (Cape Fear) river, N. C., \$5,000; improving waterway between New River and Swansboro, N. C., 5,000; improving Lockwood's Folly river, N. C., \$5,000; improving Fishing Creek, N. C., \$10,000 and improving Pasquotank river, N. C., \$3,000.

Notification has also been received that examination and surveys (with a view to possible future improvement) are to be made of the following localities:
Waterway from Pungo River to the town of Sladesville, N. C.; Drum Inlet, N. C.; waterway between Pamlico river and Bay river, N. C.; White Oak river from Robert's Landing to Collins' Crossing, N. C.; harbor of Washington, Pamlico river, N. C., and Black river, from Kingstree to its mouth, S. C.
