STATE NEWS.

Winston Daily: There is at least a prospect of iron works at Winston. We learn that a reliable firm of New York and Washington real estate men are negotiating with parties here with a view to establishing such works at an early day.

Raleigh Chronicle: A telegram was received here yesterday announcing the death of Mr. W. T. Heflin, son of Capt. R. S. Heflin, of this city. Mr. Heflin was in the railroad business in Georgia and enjoyed a prominent position in social and business circles.

Asheville Citizen: Rev. G. C. Rankin, who has had charge of the Central M. E. Church, South in this city for the past three years, has been transferred to the Missouri Conference and will take charge of a church in Kansas City. He leaves here next Monday.

The Washington papers announce that Capt. Pride Jones, who has for the last seventeen years been a conductor on the Richmond & Danville Railroad, has arrived in Washington, and will take charge of the vestibule train running from Washington to Charlotte over the Virginia Midland Railroad.

Charlotte Chronicle: The enrollment of pupils at the graded school up to yesterday was 718. The organization of Democratic Clubs in this section still progresses. A club has been organized at Matthews within the past week. The work at the Halle gold mine is turning out well. The output is now about \$5,000 per month.

Durham Sun: The Prohibition party in this country have met and put out a ticket for all county offices. It was a small convention yet it did some big resolving, and has a large platform and will have nothing to do with the old parties, yet it wants to scoop in the laboring elements and the farmers. The ticket is just as much in opposition to the Democratic nominees and party as if it were a Republican ticket.

Robesonian: We learn that a Cuban woman predicted that certain awful things would happen on the day that Steve Jacobs was to be hung, and that he would not be hanged on that day; and we rise to remark that at least a portion of her prophecy was fulfilled. The rest of her prophesy was of such a nature as to indicate that the end of the world was close at hand, but whether the action of Gov. Fowle respiting him averted the things foretold or not we cannot say, but this much we do know, last Friday was just like any other day; not even an earth quake shook was felt.

Sanford Express: Senator Vance will speak at Carthage Oct. 11th. —Barker, a white brakeman on the C. F. & Y. V. road, fell from a freight train at Rock Branch last Saturday and was severely wounded about the head. The people here complain of a pest of snails. They are found in the yards, the houses and the wells. It is stated that they have been destroying gardens in Pittsboro. While at the postoffice on Monday afternoon a citizen of this place showed us a letter containing a check for \$25 that he had just received from a young man in an adjoining county. The letter read substantially as this: "Some years ago while you were merchandising in my town I was accustomed to go into your store and steal candy and other confectionery. Then I was a boy but now I am a man and my conscience lashes me for that candy eating. I send you this check to ease my conscience. Use it and say nothing about the incident to any one. The receiver of this check turned it over to the treasury of the Methodist Church and the whole affair reads like a fairy Sunday School story."

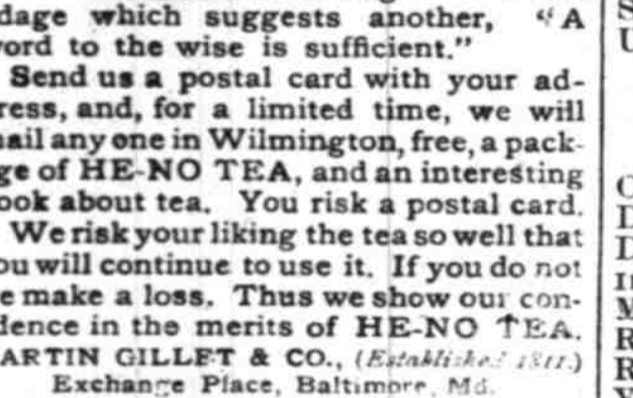
