The other clergymen in attendance were Messrs. Atkinson, Harding, George and Turner. The meetings were held in St. Paul's Church. The Convocation was expected to close to-day and the clergymen will probably return to the city to-night.

Two Beautiful Monuments.

Mr. H. A. Tucker, proprietor of the marble and granite yard on North Front street, just North of Mulberry, turns out some beautiful work. He has just completed a monument which is to be erected to the memory of Mr. O. L. Fillyaw, in Oakdale. The monument will be 3 feet 8 inches at the base and 8 feet high. He has also nearly completed one to mark the resting place of Mr. W. H. McFarland in Oakdale, 2 feet 8 inches at the base and 11 feet high. Both monuments are from the finest North Carolina granite.

Get Your Gun Ready.

The bird law will expire next Tuesday, the 14th inst., and the woods and fields will doubtless be full of sportsmen on the 15th. Birds are said to be plentiful this year, and our hunters are getting their fowling pieces ready for the exhilarating sport of taking them on the wing. The law on the subject says that "no person shall kill or shoot, net or trap, any partridges, quail, doves, robins, larks, mocking birds, or wild turkeys, between the first day of April and the 15th day of October in each year; and the person so offending shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and fined not exceeding \$10 for each offense.

Will Be There Next Month.

Capt. H. A. Whiting, General Manager of the W., O. & E. C. R. R., who was in Newbern a few days since with several gentlemen whose stockholders in the road, has returned to the city. He reports progress as satisfactory and says that the road will get into Jacksonville early in November. The *Newbern Journal* incorrectly reported but 32 miles as completed, whereas the track is now laid for 37 or 38 miles and the road is graded all of the way to Jacksonville, 50 miles from the city. Trains are now running regularly every day to the Golden Place, which is 32 miles distant from Wilmington. When Jacksonville is reached the road is to be pushed on to Newbern as rapidly as possible.

## A New Steamboat.

The new steam passenger and tow boat *Pender*, which was built near Bannerman's Bridge and owned by Messrs. Finke and Walters, arrived here yesterday afternoon for inspection. She is 80 tons burthen, 60 feet long, 13½ feet beam and has two compound engines, 8-inch cylinder, with a 12-inch stroke. She is a propeller and is fitted up with two fine cabins. The one aft is for the ladies and the forward one is for gentlemen. She is not completed but will be in about two weeks. Capt. J. L. Watson is her master and Mr. A. Hill is the engineer. When completed she will be a fine passenger boat. She draws 5 feet of water and is to run from this city to Bannerman's Bridge, making three trips a week.

## Milton Nobles.

Milton and Dolly Nobles will play here on next Monday night, the 13th inst.
