### Capt. Alexander's Speech.

Capt. S. B. Alexander, candidate  
for Congress from this district, spoke  
last night in the City Hall building,  
instead of from the portico of the  
Opera House, it being rather cool  
for an audience in the open air.  
Capt. W. P. Oldham, Chairman of  
the Congressional Committee, called  
the meeting to order and Capt.  
Alexander was handsomely intro-  
duced by Mr. J. H. Currie, who  
spoke for about 20 minutes.

Capt. Alexander made a plain,  
practical, common-sense talk to his  
audience. He outlined the great  
issues now dividing the people of  
this country, spoke of the oppres-  
sive tariff and the enormous bur-  
dens it imposes upon the shoulders  
of the poor man for the benefit of  
those already too rich in this world's  
goods; showed up in plain colors  
that great iniquity which we have  
good authority for styling the  
"damnable" pension steal, and  
dwelt at length upon the condition  
of the farmers, their appeal to each  
other for mutual protection, as of-  
fered by the Alliance and declaring  
that in the union of those two great  
and powerful elements alone rests  
the salvation of this country, pro-  
tection to the working classes and  
the perpetuation of those princi-  
ples of self-government for which  
our revolutionary fathers shed their  
blood.

Capt. Alexander was to have
