One Congressional district in New York city—the 12th, represented by Roswell P. Flower—is richer than any State in the Union except New York and Pennsylvania. The united possessions of the residents of this district are estimated to be up to \$4,000,000,000. The total wealth of Illinois is one billion less than this amount, and that of Ohio and Massachusetts is about \$1,500,000,000.

Reports encouraging to Democrats come from the 5th and the 10th Michigan Congressional districts. The Hon. Dudley Watson, who was collector of customs under Cleveland at Grand Haven, says that Mr. Ford, the Democratic candidate in the 5th district, will be elected, and J. Maurice Finn, another prominent Michigan Democrat, predicts a victory for the Democratic candidate in the 10th district. Both districts are now represented by Republicans.

It is understood that Reed and McKinley have been very much disturbed by the suggestion made by Henry George that wholesale smuggling will be carried on with perfect impunity when the Chicago Air Ship Company gets its fleet into the air. The two great statesmen, it is represented, are in doubt whether Mr. George's further suggestion that, to prevent this smuggling, it may be necessary to build a roof over the country was made in good faith or sarcastically.

During the twelve months ended the 31st of March last the estimated number of letters delivered in the United Kingdom was 1,650,500,000, which shows an increase of 5.9 per cent., and an average number to each person of 43.6: 217,100,000 post cards were delivered, which showed an increase of 7.8 per cent. Book packets and circulars numbered 441,000,000 and newspapers 159,300,000. Parcels, of which 42,853,000 were delivered, show the greatest relative increase, namely, 8.2 per cent. The practice of sending valentines appears to be diminishing.

Missouri politics is mixed this year, and nobody can predict what the Legislature will be. The prospect is that the members will be of several kinds—Democrats, Republicans, Union Laborites, Alliancists, Prohibitionists, Independents and representatives of the People's party. In contemplating the situation interest centres in the query, "What will be the action of the Legislature as to the United States Senatorship?" There is a suggestion of an answer in the fact that, of all the parties in the field, but one, the Republican party, is in sympathy with the protective idea; the rest are pledged to tariff reform. It is not probable that the Republicans will gain any Congressmen in Missouri.

A strange story comes from Bjelina, in Bosnia. A rumor is current among the peasants of the district that Baron Albert Rothschild has been sentenced to death, and that his execution will shortly take place unless he succeeds in finding a substitute prepared to suffer death on the scaffold for a consideration of 1,000,000 florins. The authorities at Bjelina have for several weeks past been pestered by applicants pre-

pared to have their heads off for the benefit of the Austrian Cæsar. It appears, however, that the applicants have formed a syndicate, among whom the million was to be divided, and that lots were to be drawn for the victim. The authorities have experienced some difficulty in attempting to convince the candidates for death that the rumor is without foundation.

Mrs. Emmons Blaine (formerly Anita McCormick) paid \$1,700 for her new baby's bassinet and trousseau. The furniture of the toilet basket is ivory boud, with the family monogram inscribed in silver turquoise and small diamonds. The tiny shirts and caps are made of woven silks; all the skirts, dresses and bibe are of pure linen, finished with real Valenciennes lace; the beautiful flannels are hand-embellished, with white silk in Marguerite rosebud designs, and in the blankets and larrycoats the initials are boldly and beautifully raised in art needlework. Not only is the youngster's spoon silver, but the soap box, the rattle and bells, the drinking mug, the fork and platter are of sterling, and there are solid gold pins for the baby's handkerchiefs and rings by the dozen for his babyship's fingers.
