It was the first picked by other than human hands ever shipped to that or any other city in the world, and if the machine does what its inventor claims for it he has revolutionized the cotton industry and at the same time settled, to a large extent, the negro question. It has been held as a valid objection to any scheme of colonizing the negro out of the South that he was essential to the cotton planter in gathering his crop. The inventor of the cotton picker claims that his machine will do the work of fifty men.


