The Board of County Commissioners have appointed Messrs. H. C. McQueen and R. W. Hicks delegates to the annual Southern Inter-State Immigration Convention, to be held at Asheville, N. C., on the 17th of December, 1890.

We regret very much to learn of the death, at Muncie, Ind., yesterday morning, of Maj. W. C. Emerson, father of Messrs. Thos. M. and Horace M. Emerson, of this city. Both of these gentlemen left here last night to attend the funeral.

Mr. J. L. Dudley paid over yesterday the widow of Mr. A. G. McGirt \$2,000 and to the widow of Mr. H. C. Prempert \$3,000, the amounts of benefits held by the deceased gentlemen in the Endowment Rank of the Knights of Pythias.

There is a deplorable condition of affairs here now. There is not a stick of oak or ash wood to be bought here. Last sales were made at \$1.50 a load, on the wharf. We really cannot understand why the wood should not be brought into market.

Dr. Potter's Report.
Dr. F. W. Potter, Superintendent of Health, reports 37 deaths in the city during the month of October, including 2 still-births. Seven deaths occurred from malarial diseases. The doctor urges the necessity of a furnace to burn garbage and condemned meats, and deprecates the irregular way of laying terra-cotta pipes for sewers by private citizens, which, he says, will result in injury to health.

The Board of Audit and Finance met yesterday afternoon in regular session. Present: Messrs. R. Jones (chairman) W. R. Kenan and Jno. W. Hewett.

Bills were audited and approved as follows: Current expenses, \$5,243.50; note \$10,000; interest on the same, \$220.44.

National W. C. T. U. Convention.
The National Convention of the W. C. T. U. will be held in Atlanta about the 10th of this month. The Georgia W. C. T. U. is working vigorously preparing for the convention.

Mrs. William C. Silby, president of the Georgia Union, has chosen Mrs. Sallie F. Chapin to deliver the address of welcome.

Wilmington will probably be represented at the convention by one or more delegates.

The Cotton Picking Machine.
It will be of interest to our farmer friends to learn that a successful cotton picking machine really has been invented. At the Memphis Cotton Exchange a day or two ago a bale of cotton was exhibited that was picked by machinery. It was the first picked by other than human hands ever shipped to that or any other city in the world, and if the machine does what its inventor claims for it he has revolutionized the cotton industry and at the same time settled, to a large extent, the negro question. It has been held as a valid objection to any scheme of colonizing the negro out of the South that he was essential to the cotton planter in gathering his crop. The inventor of the cotton picker claims that his machine will do the work of fifty men.

The Week of Prayer.

Found in the River.
We learned yesterday afternoon, just before going to press, that the body of Alfred Morgan, the young Englishman who escaped from the City Hospital some days ago, had been found in the river. It was found in the afternoon by a colored man by the name of Savage, opposite Kidder's Mill. Savage towed the body up to the wharf at the foot of Dock street, and notified Coroner Jacobs, who took charge of the remains which were fully identified as those of the unfortunate young man. There were no marks of violence on the body, and the jury of inquest found "that the deceased came to his death by accidental drowning."

By direction of Mr. Jas. Sprunt, the British Counsel, the body was placed in the charge of an undertaker to be prepared for burial and will be interred in Bellevue Cemetery to-day.

The Election.
Everything has passed off harmoniously here to-day. It has been a bright, pleasant, sunny day and as a consequence the registered strength of the two parties has been steadily polled. The Democrats registered nearly up to their entire strength but the Republicans fell greatly behind. Indifference and disaffection combined have wrought this. Our paper closes an hour or more before the polls close and it is therefore impossible to forecast the result. All that is known at this time is that the result will be close, with the chances in favor of the Democrats. We greatly fear, however, that we will lose, despite the gallant fight which has been made to carry the county. The issue has been mainly between the two parties, the side show in the shape of the Independent Republican ticket counting as a very small factor in the fight.

Board of Aldermen.
The Board met in regular session last night at the City Hall; Mayor Fowler presided.

The Police Committee reported the appointment of J. S. Piver and E. Piner as members of the force in place of officers Gafford and Green, resigned. The report was adopted.

The Committee on Permanent Street Improvements reported the cost of laying the sidewalk on Third street, between Chesnut and Mulberry, as \$248, and submitted the following recommendations, which were adopted:

1st. That the provisions of the act of Legislature under which the work was ordered be carried out by the Mayor at once.

2d. That Third street, between Mulberry and Chestnut, be graded and improved to conform with this sidewalk under the supervision of the Mayor and City Engineer.

The reports of the Chief of the Fire Department and the Superintendent of Health were read and ordered on file.

On Alderman Hicks' motion it was ordered that repairs be made to the fire wharf at the foot of Chestnut street.

Application of Jno. B. Richardson for privilege of renting stall No. 3, in Front street market house, was referred to the Market House Committee.

Petition of J. J. Herring, night watchman, for compensation for performing police duty was referred to the Police Committee.

Alderman Geo. L. Morton tendered his resignation as a member of the Board from the First Ward. On motion his resignation was accepted.

Alderman Pearsall asked by what authority the sewer on Princess street was constructed, and spoke in opposition to such privileges being granted, in view of the fact that the city would probably adopt a general plan of sewerage. After discussion, further consideration of the matter was postponed until an adjourned meeting to be held to-morrow afternoon.

County Commissioners.
The Board met yesterday afternoon in regular session. Present, Messrs. H. A. Bagg, (chairman), Roger Moore, B. G. Worth, Jas. A. Montgomery and E. L. Pearce.

E. Hewlett, county treasurer, submitted his monthly report, showing a balance of \$17,130.35 on hand—\$8,274.04 to the credit of the general and \$8,856.27 to the credit of the educational fund.

The Register of Deeds submitted his monthly report of fees received on account of marriage licenses, amounting to \$25.65, and exhibited the Treasurer's receipt for the same.

Ordered, that John E. Wood and W. H. Davis be relieved of payment of poll tax on account of physical disability.

Ordered, that the bond of the Register of Deeds be increased from \$5,000 to \$10,000 to take effect from and after the first Monday in December next.

Ordered, that tax charged against A. H. Neff, on Block 152, be remitted the same being the property of heirs of L. A. Hart, and having been listed by them.
