The receipts of cotton at this port for the week ending with to-day foot up 6,937 bales, as against 9,456 bales for the corresponding period last year. The receipts of the crop year to date foot up 112,972 bales, as against 71,033 bales to same date last year, an increase this year of 41,940 bales.

State Board of Canvassers.  
The State Board of Canvassers will meet in Raleigh as required by law on the Thursday following the third Monday after election day, which will fall on Thursday, the 27th inst.  
The board is composed of the Governor, Secretary of State, the Attorney General and two Senators elect of the next General Assembly, one from each party, to be appointed by the Governor. The Governor has appointed Mr. A. C. Green, Senator elect from Wake, and Mr. Z. V. Waiser, Senator elect from Davidson, to serve on the board.

First Ward Democrats.  
A meeting of the Democratic voters of the First Ward was held last night at Phoenix Hall. Mr. Geo. L. Morton was called to the chair, and Mr. J. C. Strauss was appointed secretary.  
The chairman stated that the object of the meeting was to ascertain the choice of the ward for an Alderman to fill the vacancy on the Board caused by the resignation of Alderman Morton.  
A motion was adopted that a ballot be taken, the person receiving a majority of the votes cast to be recommended for Alderman.  
Tellers were appointed and Dr. A. L. Scott, Wm. H. Strauss, Esq., and Mr. C. Schulken were put in nomination. Only one ballot was cast: Scott receiving 60 votes, Strauss 58, Schulken 12, D. H. Russell 1. The total vote cast 132; necessary to a choice 67.  
A motion was then made for another ballot but it was lost, and after considerable wrangling, a motion to postpone further action until Friday night, was adopted and the meeting adjourned to assemble again at the same place this evening at 8 o'clock.
