Peter Petersen was discharged and Carl, his brother, was found guilty and sent to jail for 30 days.

The Chrysanthemum Show.
The chrysanthemum show, by the ladies of the Mite Society of St. James' Church, yesterday afternoon, was a singularly successful affair. Notwithstanding the unpromising weather the attendance was very large. The exhibition of the beautiful Fall flowers was an exceedingly handsome one. A number of other cities contributed to the show. Mrs. T. A. Hodges, the lady of whom we spoke on Thursday as having such a large and superb assortment in her garden in this city, exhibited one hundred varieties. The ladies dispensed refreshments and we are glad to know that the receipts would surely be hailed with delight.

R. & G. and R. & A. Stockholders Meet.
The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Raleigh & Gaston Railroad was held at Raleigh Thursday. A large majority of the stock was represented. Dr. W. J. Hawkins was chosen chairman and W. V. Vass and J. M. Sherwood secretaries, and the reports of the President, General Manager and Treasurer were all read and were very satisfactory to the stockholders.

We learn from the *News and Observer* that Mr. John M. Robinson was unanimously re-elected President, as were also all the old Board of Directors. The Directors met after the meeting of the stockholders and re-elected all the old officers.

The meeting of the stockholders of the Raleigh & Augusta Air Line Railroad was also held on Thursday at 12 o'clock at the office of the Raleigh & Gaston Railroad Company. Nearly the entire stock was represented in person or by proxy. The reports of the President, General Manager and Treasurer were submitted and showed a most satisfactory increase in the business of the road and the President and Directors were all re-elected as were all its old officers.

The Georgia, Carolina and Northern.
Abbeville has celebrated the completion of this road from Monroe to that place, and now the road is pushing for Atlanta. A correspondent of the *News and Courier*, after describing the celebration, gives us some points about the road. The cost of the road per mile has been about \$30,000, which does not cover any of the rolling stock whatever. The road has been built entirely by a syndicate, at whose head is the Hon. John M. Robinson. It is magnificently equipped in every way and is one of the finest built roads in the South. So far one hundred and fifty nine miles have been completed and the road is now operated from Monroe, N. C., to Abbeville. The roadbed is perfect and the rails are all new and are sixty pound steel rails. When the road is completed from Monroe, N. C., to Atlanta it will be 260 miles in length, and it will be controlled, of course, by its owners, who are, as has been stated, the syndicate controlling and running the Seaboard Air Line system of railroads. A great deal of credit for excellent construction of the road is due to Major John Temple, the chief engineer of the road, whose headquarters are now, as they have been for the past year, at Greenwood. He has had entire supervision of the construction of the road, and no one who has seen what good work has been done can fail to commend and congratulate Major Temple.

The Superintendent of the road is Capt. John A. Dodson, who has charge of it from Monroe to Abbeville, and when completed will also be in charge of the whole line.
