A singular death occurred in New York on Saturday. A lineman was stricken with apoplexy at the top of a pole and fell dead to the ground.

A charter has been filed at Topeka, Kan., for the construction of a line of railroad from Omaha to Galveston, Tex. The capital stock is \$18,000,000, and the length of the road nine hundred miles.

The gross earnings of 127 railroads in September were \$59,472,038, an increase of \$4,626,198 over the corresponding month last year. The net was \$21,782,191, an increase of \$938,766 over last year.

Mrs. Anne Sheldon Coombs, an authoress of some repute, a very handsome woman and the wife of the son of Congressman-elect Coombs of Brooklyn, deliberately jumped to her death from the sixth story of the Pierpont House in Brooklyn on Saturday. She had been suffering from nervous prostration and was undoubtedly insane.

There is a good thing in yesterday's New York Herald. A cartoon represents Harrison, Blaine, Noble and others of the cabinet seated around a table. There is a dish in the center and from this Madison Columbia has just raised the cover, showing a stalwart rooster flapping his wings and crowing for all he is worth. "Why, it's alive," is the exclamation from all and they start back from the table, little Benny, a diminutive figure, who is seated on a high child's chair, nearly tipping himself back. It's a good thing.

It is now definitely determined that the Democratic majority in the next House will be 142. This is the result of the unofficial list compiled in the office of the Clerk of the House. It shows that 222 Democrats have been elected, on a straight ticket, the number of Republicans being 92. It gives the Farmers' Alliance a representation of 17, but 12 of this number come from the South, and will act with the Democratic party, thus swelling the latter's aggregate vote to 234. The Democratic majority over the Republicans is therefore 130 or 142, counting the 12 Alliance men as Democrats.

The Indians out in the Northwest are insolent. This is the term applied to them when they get clamorous for the provisions and supplies which some of the government agents cheat them out of. At the present time they are mad and are "dancing." This dancing business consists in joining hands around a tall tree and circling around, first in one direction and then in the other, without food and without drink, until they drop exhausted. Some die and some don't. The Sioux (pronounced So) are making all of the trouble now and it is said that Sitting Bull has instigated it. But the troops are being concentrated and it is hoped that trouble may be prevented.

It is expected that a great deal of freight will be brought in here over this road, from New River, within the next few weeks. As soon as the connection is made the lumber and other materials for Mr. McIntyre's residence on New River will be hauled to the spot and work on the building will begin at once.

R. at Scott's Hill and beyond it, there are fine farms and the attraction for squirrels and rabbits is very great. Beyond, on the left, the big Holy Shelter swamp makes down near the Onslow county line and gets in very close to the railroad. In this swamp there is almost every kind of game—bears, deers, cats, squirrels, rabbits, turkeys and birds. This swamp is probably pretty dry now and easy of access but to those of our friends who may penetrate to its recesses on Thanksgiving Day we would suggest all due caution, lest they get lost. Take a guide with you, and a compass—something more reliable in this latter time than a watch. We would not like to get lost in that swamp and have to depend upon a watch as a compass to help us out of the scrape.


