The New York Star says that President Harrison is reported as determined to do all that he possibly can to secure the passage of the Fraud and Force Election bill before the Fifty-first Congress goes into well merited oblivion. We are not surprised that he considers desperate measures are necessary to save the falling fortunes of his party but it will take more than the bayonets of the United States to drive to the Republican ballot boxes the thousands of honest Republicans who last week repudiated Harrison, Quay, McKinley and their associates.

It is very satisfactory, says the Raleigh News and Observer, to observe that the Democrats have the majority in thirty of the Congressional delegations. In case no Presidential candidate obtains a majority of the electoral votes in 1892 the choice will be thrown into the hands of Representatives, where each State has a single vote. In the House there will be 44 votes, and of these the Democrats will command 30. It is by no means impossible that the election may be thrown into the hands of three parties with candidates, to wit: the Democratic, the Republican, and the Farmers' Alliance. The latter will probably carry some of the Western States, which might have the effect of preventing any choice by the electoral college. This would insure a Democratic President.

Honduras, which at one time may have expected to take part in the war between Guatemala and Salvador, although relieved from that necessity, has had experience of a short and sharp insurrection in her own domains. An uprising of a portion of the troops of the capital, a few days ago, under Gen. Sanchez, proved so effective that President Borgan was glad to make his escape from the city. Then, calling upon other portions of the army and the people to rally to his aid, with rather remarkable celerity he fought his way back into the capital, and defeated and captured Sanchez and his followers. The whole performance was transacted with a rapidity to which Central American revolutions ought perhaps by this time to have accustomed us. It was feared at one time that President Barrios, of Guatemala, who is very friendly to Bogran, might furnish troops to aid him, in which case Salvador was apparently ready to resent this interference. But no such difficulty arose, President Bogran finding ample forces to put down their insurrection.

Col. Lucas Miltiades Miller, the Democratic Congressman-elect from the Oshkosh, Wis., district, is a Greek, pure and simple. He was born in Lavadia, Greece, September 15, 1824. His father was killed in the Greek revolution while Mr. Miller was an infant, and his mother died soon after her husband was killed. A short time afterward he was adopted by an American, Col. J. P. Miller, who had also fought in the Grecian war, and came with that gentleman to America in 1828. From him he took his last name, Miller. Col. J. P. Miller located at Montpelier, Vermont, and it was here that Lucas grew to manhood. He received an academic education and read law with Col. Miller and United States Senator Wm. Upham. At the age of 21 years he was admitted to the Bar, and soon afterward conceived the idea of going West. In 1846 he went directly to Oshkosh, then a little Indian trading village of half a dozen houses. Here he succeeded well in his profession, and became wealthy by the advance in land, in which he had largely invested. The district was heavily Republican at the previous Congressional election, and the Democratic outlook was so gloomy that Mr. Miller's campaign expenses were only \$13.65. His election was a surprise to everybody.

In spectroscopic astronomy the eye has been superseded of late to a great extent by the photographic plate, which is now able to recognize fainter impressions than the eye, and to register them permanently. The instrument employed is a photographic telescope, with a prism, or a series of prisms, in front of the object glass, the whole mounted like any large telescope and provided with an accurate driving clock. It has thus become possible to complete in a comparatively short time a general survey of the spectra of all brighter stars of the Northern Hemisphere, and the survey is now being extended to the Southern Hemisphere where it is already well advanced.
