There is certainly something really wonderful about his preaching. There were some additions to the Baptist Church, and there is a promise of additions to the others. The meetings closed, as I have said, in the Court House and the good people of Burgaw presented Mr. Peele with a purse of \$42."

The Baptists.

The Union Meeting of the Eastern Baptist Association began its session at Brooklyn Baptist Church at 10 o'clock this forenoon. There are 19 churches in the Association 11 of which were represented. The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. Mr. Wooten after which an organization was effected by the election of Mr. John T. Bland as President and Mr. D. J. Corbett as Secretary.

The meeting being organized, the various necessary committees were appointed, and a plan of procedure adopted. Rev. R. E. Peele, pastor of Brooklyn Baptist Church, then made an address of welcome in a brief and characteristic speech, which was responded to in a fitting terms by the President, Mr. Bland.

It was decided that the meetings should begin at 10 a. m. and continue until noon, and then begin at 7 o'clock p. m. and adjourn when they get ready during the continuance of the meeting. It was also decided not to have any stated preaching during the meeting, further than might be suggested by the different queries which are to be discussed.

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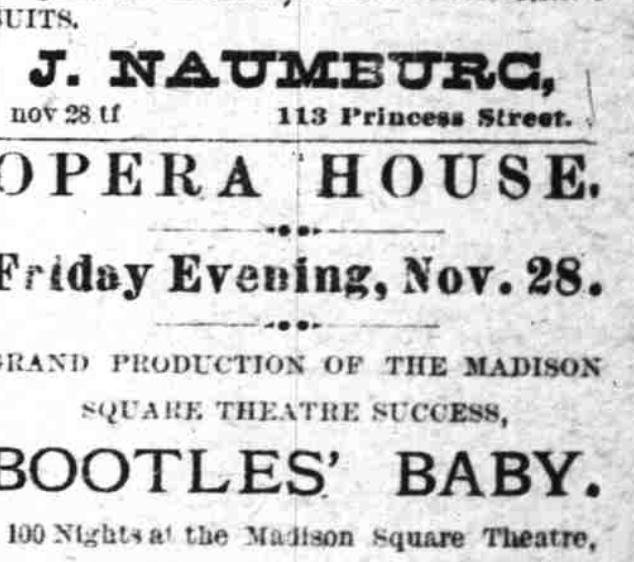
