The net loss of daylight this month is but 10 minutes. In the mornings we lose 20 minutes but in the afternoons we gain 10. The sun rose this morning at 6.51 and will rise on the 31st at 7.11; it sets this evening at 4.46 and will set on the 31st at 4.56.

The election of the Colonel, Lieutenant Colonel and Major for the Second Regiment, N. C. S. G., will be held in this city on Thursday next. The election board is composed of the captain and first lieutenant of each company and only commissioned officers can vote.

The Goldsboro Argus says: "Our estimable young friend and townsman, Mr. L. L. Burkhead, has been appointed to a railroad position and assigned to service between Wilmington and Charleston. He left for his new post Wednesday evening."

Last month was an exceedingly dry month; in fact, it is the driest November on record here with one exception since the Signal Office was opened in 1871. On two days only did rain fall and the total precipitation was but .36 of an inch. The exception was in 1886 when but .19 of an inch fell.

A colored rice planter by the name of W. H. Wiggins, whose farm is near Little Bridge lost his barn and 2,800 bushels of rough rice yesterday morning, about 2 o'clock. No one seems to know how the fire originated. There was insurance on the barn and rice with Messrs. Hodges & Taylor, which is thought to be sufficient to cover the loss.

Harbor Master's Report.

From the books of Capt. Joseph Price, Harbor Master, we get the following report of arrivals, at this port during the month of November:

American—6 steamers, 4,268 tons; 1 brig, 280 tons; 13 schooners, 4,075 tons; total 20 vessels and 8,632 tons.

Foreign—2 steamers, 2,410 tons; 16 barques, 7,551 tons; 3 brigs, 827 tons; 4 schooners, 489 tons; total 25 vessels and 11,386 tons.

Total arrivals American and foreign 45 vessels, aggregating 19,918 tons.

The Old and the New.

The full proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners could not be had in time for this issue, but will appear to-morrow. The old Board retired and the new Board were sworn in and organized and elected Mr. Bagg as chairman. There is no difference in the personnel of the two Boards. The new Democratic county official also qualified and the old incumbents quietly retired. There has been no particular excitement and really not as much interest manifested as might have been expected.

Death of Col. Collier.

Col. Geo. W. Collier, one of the oldest and most highly esteemed residents of Wayne county, died at his home in Goldsboro some time between 5.30 and 7 o'clock on Saturday morning. His death was very sudden, although he had been suffering for some days past with a bronchial trouble. It is supposed that he died of heart failure. Col. Collier was in his 76th year and leaves a wife and five children, all grown. Mr. S. P. Collier, of this city, was his son and with his family was present at the funeral services, which took place yesterday afternoon from St. Stephen's Church.

Chaffee, Signal Observer at this port, reports as follows for the month of November: Mean barometer, 30.17; highest, 31.36, on the 21st; lowest, 29.80, on the 30th; mean temperature, 55; highest, 80, on the 10th; lowest, 32, on the 28th; greatest daily range, 34, on the 7th; least daily range, 5, on the 13th; total excess of temperature during the month 93; total excess since January 1st, 13.49; cloudless days, 17; partly cloudy days, 8; cloudy days, 5; frosts on the 1st, 3d, 4th, 28th and 29th.

Fire at Wrightsville.

Yesterday morning, between 2 and 3 o'clock, the residence of Mr. C. C. Ketchum, a well known citizen who lives near Wrightsville, was found to be on fire. Mr. Ketchum had occasion to get up and give one of his children some water and thus discovered the fire. At that time the kitchen roof had fallen in and the back part of the residence was in a blaze. On opening the door of the building the smoke and fire rushed in giving the older members of the family but little time to arouse the sleeping children, and to carry them with such articles as were in easy reach to a place of safety. The destruction was complete, as the family lost nearly every article of clothing, furniture and crockery, stove and its fixtures. In fact, they lost them all. Professor Lagacy has an interesting sketch of Morelli, the leader of the modern Italian school of painting, and Humphrey Ward tells about "Christie's"—the famous London auction rooms.

Cotton.

The receipts of cotton at this port for the month of November, just closed, foot up 27,810 bales, against 28,431 sales for same month last year, a decrease during the month of \$614 bales. The receipts of the crop year to date foot up 126,713 bales, against 84,839 bales to same date last year, an increase this year of 41,874 bales.

Don't Believe a Word of It.

It is reported here that the grand jury of the U. S. Circuit Court, now in session at Raleigh has found a true bill against the board of canvassers for New Hanover county for throwing out the returns from Cape Fear township. We have endeavored to trace the report but cannot come up with the party with whom it is said to have originated. It must certainly be erroneous. In the first place the Federal Court has no jurisdiction beyond a hearing and decision as regards the vote for Congressman and the vote in Cape Fear township cannot affect the result of this election. Secondly, the grand jury of the Federal Court can have nothing to do with the matter unless fraud is charged and we do not think any one would presume to charge the board of canvassers with fraud, as there is not the slightest evidence of anything of this kind. As to the State elections the Federal Court has no jurisdiction whatever in the case. The State courts only can decide in this matter. The case, we understand, is to be carried before the Superior Court in January and if the decision there is against the Republicans they propose to carry it on appeal to the Supreme Court of the State and there the matter will be finally decided. So far as we can ascertain there is no charge of fraud against the board to be made in the State courts but the case is to be heard on appeal from the decision of the board of canvassers.
