 Judge Farrar left here last night to return to his home at Amelia C. H. Va. Judge Farrar is the representative of an old family, formerly, possessed of wealth and influence but impoverished by the war. He still has large landed estates and his house is a very large mansion and will accommodate many people. He is to entertain there in a few days the Philadelphia Hunting Club, an amateur organization, consisting of 40 men and 50 dogs. They are to remain with him ten days and will pay him \$1,250 for board during that period.

Thieves at Work.
 Thieves broke into the Racket store last night or early this morning and into Mr. B. F. Swann's store adjoining, both situated on South Front street, opposite the market. It appears that the Racket store was first entered and ransacked. They took thence a number of pair of shoes, with stockings, etc. to match and then broke into the money drawer and took \$15 in silver which they found there. The goods they stole were worth about \$25 and hence the loss was in all about \$40. They then broke into Mr. Swann's store and sampled lots of Christmas supplies they found there. They also visited the money drawer in Mr. Swann's store but they got nothing there as the funds had all been removed the previous night. So far there is no clue to the thieves, although the police are working on the case.

The Thanksgiving Service.
 Bishop and Mrs. Watson were in Washington City yesterday and left there this morning, expecting to arrive here to-night. The thanksgiving service heretofore spoken of by us is officially announced for to-morrow. It will be held in St. John's Church at 10:30 o'clock and the ministers of all of the Episcopal churches in the city will take part, all of the congregations worshipping together. The seats will be free and the public are cordially invited. All of the standing committee of the diocese, consisting of Rev. Dr. Huske, of Fayetteville, Rev. Dr. Carmichael and Rev. Robert Strange, of this city, and Dr. A. J. DeRosset, and Mr. George Roberts, of Newbern, will be present. Dr. Huske will preach the sermon and speak the welcome. The music will be rendered by a double quartette and will be very fine, exquisite but simple.

From 12 m. to 2 p. m. on the same day there will be a social reception for Bishop and Mrs. Watson in St. John's rectory, where the congregation of the Parish will be glad to welcome all who desire to extend their congratulations.

Judge Farrar's Lecture.
 Judge Farrar has accomplished that which has of late years been classed as an almost impossibility in Wilmington. He has drawn out a large house as a lecturer. He has done much more than this; he has had three fine houses in two days.

The attendance last night was large and it is seldom that a more thoroughly cultured and appreciative audience has been gathered in our beautiful Opera House. Judge Farrar's fame as a speaker, a raconteur and a raconteur, the object for which the entertainment was given, the promised presence of the W. L. L., clad in the deeply loved gray, and the theme, ever touching, ever faithful and always brimming over with interest for a Wilmington audience, all combined to attract together those who last night sat in front of the distinguished lecturer and enjoyed the delightful intellectual feast spread out before them.

It is not our purpose to follow Judge Farrar even in a brief synopsis. We can only say that his portraiture of the gallant hero of hundreds of fights, his valor, his endurance, his persevering, faithful and steady adherence to the failing fortunes of the Confederacy as, clad almost in rags, barefooted, half-starved and half-armed he sprang forward with an invincible heroism to meet the world in arms against him was truly faithful and touching. The "curled darlings of fortune" were there—young men just fresh from academic halls, born and reared in the very lap of luxury, accustomed all of their lives to be waited upon and petted and made much of—these same "darlings" in rags, footsore, weary and hungry, fought side by side with the country boy and the artisan's son, all animated by the same impulse, all ready to dare and die for the homes they loved and the rights they defended. Judge Farrar was at times so pathetic, so tender and so true to the truth that eyes long unaccustomed to tears would overflow. It was not all pathos, however, but many ripples of laughter broke forth as some humorous scene was told with all of its ludicrous accompaniments. Judge Farrar should come again. He knows how to talk to a Wilmington audience and they have found out this fact and will swarm to hear him whenever he comes among us.

The Last Sad Rites.
 The mortal remains of Mr. John E. Grant were laid to rest this afternoon in Bellevue Cemetery. The funeral services took place at Fifth Street M. E. Church and were conducted by Rev. R. C. Beaman. A long line of sorrowing relatives and friends accompanied the remains to their last home and in the line were members of Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Co. No. 1, Cape Fear and Orion lodges, I. O. O. F., and members of Stonewall, Clarendon and Germania lodges K. of P. The pallbearers were Messrs. W. E. Yopp and Jos. D. Smith; from W. S. F. E. Co. No. 1; Messrs. R. F. Warren and W. C. VonGlahn, from the K. of P.; Messrs. J. W. Fleet and W. H. Register, from the I. O. O. F., and Messrs. L. M. Letgwin and Charles Frost, from Fifth Street M. E. Church.
