The Library Association has made

excellent progress since last year. Then there were only 51 paying members-now there are 119; a gain of 150 per cent. There are now 177 different magazines on its tables, of agreeable liquid fruit remedy Syrup which 185 are bought and the rest of Figs a few years ago has been loaned by members. About 120 volumes of general literature, a large cyclopedia Brittanica have been received during the past year. The Library has also been a U.S. public depository of governmental publications. A table, three table covers. eleven book cases, four periodical cases, twenty newspaper files, two newspaper racks, and a transparency have been added to the furni ture, while the old book cases and newspaper cases have been remodelled and painted. About twenty ed upon the walls; and the old carrepaired, re-placed and arranged in systematic order according to their subject matter and order. A list has been made of the entire collec tion, and a card catalogue has been added to enable persons to find quickly and readily any book in the library. This card catalogue is equa in thoroughness to that of any

library in the United States. Visitors to the library (and they are increasing in numbers each day) are beginning to appreciate the use and value of a trained librarianand ours is one of the best in the country. One square advertisements have been inserted in all the daily papers, over 10.000 circulars as to the library have been distributed about the city, and everything done to invite the public to the rooms. A series of eight stereopticon lectures and two concerts have been given under the auspices of the Library during the past year.

This library is a credit to the city and should by all means be encour aged and sustained. Capt. Bixby's efforts have been a labor of love and not of money. He is anxious to see it placed upon a high plane of usefuluess and profit to its members and he has therefore freely given of his time and energy to accom plish so desirable a result. There is every encouragement now to hope for a geater degree of prosperity next year, and with this end in view, arrangements will be made for a series of pleasing entertainments during the Winter.
