Galveston, Texas, is rejoicing over the discovery of an underground stream of fresh, pure water only 310 feet below the surface. It was struck by an Artesian well drill. "Such a discovery as this," exclaims the Daily News, "is worth millions to Galveston. The present well yields 75,000 gallons a day, and the water being so near the surface makes it an easy and inexpensive thing to sink just as many wells as may be needed."

"It is all nonsense," the Barnesville (Ga.) Gazette tells us, "to say that a colored man cannot prosper and accumulate money in this portion of our country. There are numerous examples to sustain this assertion. Henry Penfroy is a colored man living some miles from Barnesville on the Yatesville road. He owns a good plantation, mules, horses and cattle, and is worth about \$2,500. He has good credit in Barnesville, Thomaston, Gulladen and Yatesville, and his best friends are among the white people."

The Washington correspondent of the New York Times says: "There is a hand which is Italian and ex ceeding fine. It belongs to Mr. Jas. G. Blaine, and, like Mary's sister, Martha, it is busy about many things. By an Act of Congress this hand has an official connection with the World's Fair. By an act of James G. Blaine this hand would have a much closer and more personal connection with the World's Fair. The World's Fair is his oyster. In the oyster is a pearl, and the pearl will look well in the plumelet of the doughty knight."

"It is no longer a 'Solid South,'" remarks the Louisville Courier-Journal. "It is a solid Union, demanding moderation and lower taxes." This same idea is expressed by the Montgomery (Ala) Advertiser, which says, looking forward to 1891: "In all there will be Republican Governors in thirteen States, a Farmers' Alliance Governor in Kansas, two States in dispute, and Democratic Governors in twenty-eight of the forty-four States. Illinois and Indiana, although having Republican Governors, went strongly Democratic at the last election. The Democratic States, with these exceptions, and also excluding Minnesota and California, comprise the great States of the American Union and include a population of about 50,700,000 as against 17,800,000 in the Republican States. We guess that will do. It is not a solid Democratic South any longer, but getting to be a tolerably solid Democratic United States."

A special despatch to the Philadelphia Times from Washington says: "There is very general denunciation of Senator Delamater among his political friends in this city." It is now an open secret, but well authenticated, that Delamater has involved Senator Quay for a large amount. Quay's own ban in Beaver holds Delamater's obligations for \$38,000, for which Quay is responsible, and there are apparently credible rumors of large additional sums for which Quay is liable.

There was a general feeling of sympathy exhibited here for Delamater when his failure was first announced; but he is now universally denounced. Quay refuses to say anything about his own obligations for Delamater, but it is known to his close friends that he is stinging to the quick by Delamater's methods. The Times, which published a very sympathetic editorial the day after the Delamater failure was announced, and which spoke in the highest terms of W. Delamater personally, says: "In the light of recent developments here and Mr. Delamater obtained these loans with the honest desire of saving his credit and that of his banking house, he would have so applied them to avert failure, but when he saw that failure was inevitable common honesty demanded that he should promptly return the loans to the lenders."
