Mr. Jas. F. Post, of this city, has in his possession a wonderful and curious book. It is "The British Architect; or, The Builder's Treasury." It was printed at London in the year 1600 and is therefore nearly 300 years old. The type are of the old style, the paper is the heavy parchment paper of the old times and the binding is of calf. It is profusely and handsomely illustrated with models and designs. Mr. Post bought it of Mr. James McClennan, the marble cutter who finished off the stonework of the elegant residence of Hon. C. M. Stedman, which was erected by the late Mr. John A. Taylor, father of Col. John D. Taylor. Others possessed it, however, before it came into Mr. McClennan's hands as we find the names there of John Smith, 1770, Richard Robinson, 1792 and Thos. Crytine, no date.

The skirt dance, participated in by Messrs. Robinson, Shrier, Morrison and Moore was one of the most taking things of the evening.

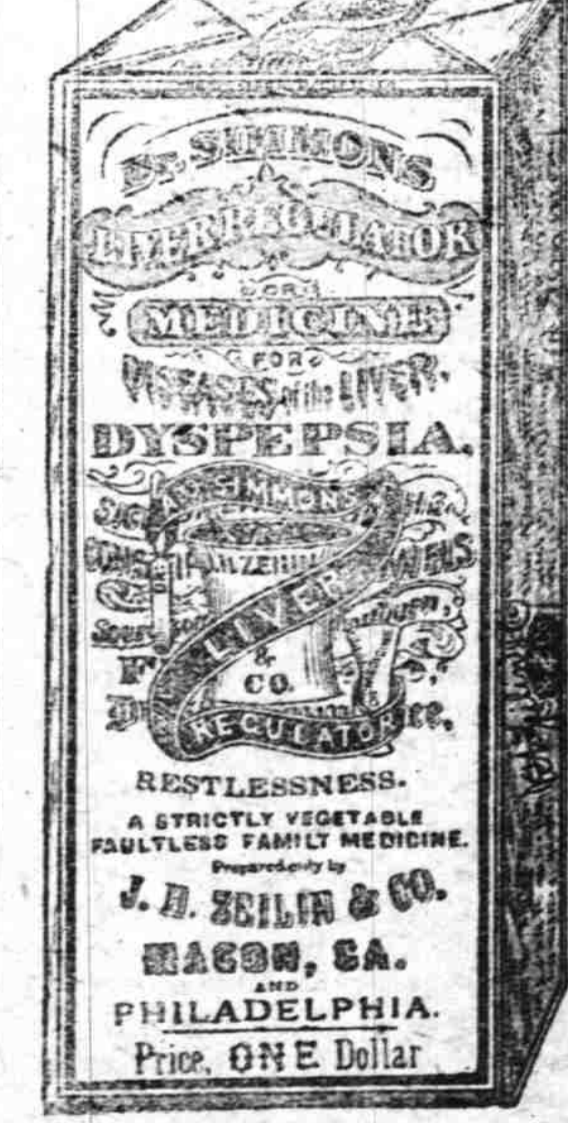
