Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in called session yesterday afternoon, to hear the report of the special committee to whom was referred the application of the Wilmington, Onslow & East Carolina Railroad, for right of way along South Front and Surry streets to Castle.

The report of the majority of the committee, Aldermen Montgomery (chairman) and Craft, was read, as follows:

Your committee, to whom was referred the petition of the W. O. & E. C. R. Co., asking for a license to use Front and Surry streets, with its railroad tracks, and also to open Surry street, respectfully report that have given the subject careful consideration, having given public audience to all persons, citizens and property owners, desiring to be heard. Your committee think that any railroad terminating in the city should have communication with the river, and that the city along its entire river front must eventually be given up to trade, commerce and manufacture, and that the public interest requires a liberal policy on the part of the city respecting its streets in that portion of the city, towards any railroad company or other business interest requiring it. They, therefore, recommend the passage of an ordinance granting the license referred to in the petition substantially according to the diagram attached thereto, but which shall particularly define the tracks, and providing that it shall cross Dawson street at a point east of Surry street, if Surry street should be opened through the land of the Wilmington Cotton Mills, and subjecting the railroad company to such conditions and regulations as the Board may see fit to require. Your committee further report that they see no need, growing out of the public necessity or exigency, for opening of Surry street beyond its present limit of improvement for the present. Respectfully submitted.

Alderman Smith, the third member of the committee, submitted a minority report, as follows:

As one of the committee appointed by you to look into the advisability of granting the petition of the W. O. & E. C. R. Co., asking for the privilege of right of way along certain streets of this city, and also that of Messrs. S. & W. H. Northrop and others, I beg leave to say that I concur in the report made by the majority of the committee, except as to granting right of way to the said railroad company along Front street. Recognizing the fact that a railroad is for the public good, I would say that no unnecessary obstacle should be put in their way and therefore recommend that they be allowed to cross whatever streets between their present location and the proposed one it would be necessary to cross to reach it, but when the right of way over property adjacent to Front street can be purchased as cheap as they can get it, I do not think that this city is called upon to give any portion of a principal street for railroad purposes, except for crossing, as stated.

Alderman Pearsall moved the adoption of the minority report. The motion was lost, and the majority report, as submitted, was adopted.

The Mayor stated that it was incumbent on the Ordinance Committee to prepare an ordinance in regard to the matter.

Col. A. M. Waddell, attorney for the railroad company, said that it was important that there be no delay in the matter. The company were ready to go to work at once, and if they had to wait until the next regular meeting of the Board it would be ruinous to their interests.

Alderman Smith moved that the Board adjourn until 3 p. m. Wednesday to hear the report of the Ordinance Committee.

Alderman Craft offered as a substitute that the Board meet at 8 p. m. this (Tuesday) evening. Alderman Craft's substitute was adopted.

Alderman Post called attention to the fact that the railroad company had already the right of way on Queen street, and it was stated that the company would surrender that right.

A petition for permission to erect a wooden building, to be covered with tin and to be used as a blacksmith shop, on Nutt street, between Red Cross and Walnut, was, on motion of Alderman Pearsall, not granted.

Alderman Post called attention to the matter of preparing plans for a system of sewerage. While an appropriation had been voted for the purpose, the sanitary committee had not been authorized to go ahead, and he asked that the Board take some action in the matter. Mr. Rudolph Herring, sanitary engineer, had made a proposition to furnish plans for \$1,000.

Alderman Pearsall offered the following resolution in regard to the matter, which was adopted:

That the Sewerage Committee be authorized to negotiate with Mr. Rudolph Herring, or any other competent sanitary engineer, for plans and specifications for a system of sewerage, and that the committee be authorized to have necessary surveys made for the perfection of the plans under the supervision of the City Surveyor.

The Board then adjourned.

The Vaudevilles Last Night.

There was another fine audience at the Opera House last night to greet the Vaudevilles. As on the first appearance, the entertainment was a thoroughly superb one and it was presented to a delighted audience. If anything, there was an improvement over the first presentation, although that was tip-top. Quite a handsome sum was realized the net proceeds being for the benefit of the Seaman's Free Library and Reading Room.

A Sad Occurrence.

The wife of Capt. Thorsen, of the Norbarque Rosenberg, at Southport, and bound out, died yesterday and the remains were brought to the city this morning on the Pasport and were interred in Oakdale Cemetery this afternoon, from St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church. It is a sad thing and many have been the expressions of condolence with Capt. Thorsen in his sad affliction. The deceased lady leaves a child a few days old.
