**Memorial Day**  
Memorial Day falls next year on Sunday but the ladies of the Memorial Association have concluded not to postpone its observance but to have the services on that day. As the exercises are always of a religious nature, this will be perfectly right and proper, but to still further emphasize this fact they have concluded to have a sermon, instead of an address. The secretary was therefore directed to invite Rev. George Patterson, D. D., formerly Rector of St. John's Church, in this city, but now of Christ Church, Memphis, to deliver the sermon. Hearing that Dr. Patterson had written to a friend here saying that he had accepted the invitation, we applied to the secretary and ascertained that she had received from him a formal acceptance.

Dr. Patterson was Chaplain of the gallant Third N. C. Infantry during the war and was with them during their most arduous campaigns, at the front in many a bloody battle, and therefore a sermon from him on Memorial Day will be most appropriate.

**Heavy Express Freights.**  
It is probable—in fact, it is certain—that more express freight was handled here this Christmas than was ever known here before at any time. The volume of business was tremendous. Everywhere it was the same. No. 23, the train due here at 5:50 p. m. from the North, on Christmas Eve night, was a very long train and a heavy one. In it there were four cars loaded with express freight, part of which was distributed at every station between Weldon and Wilmington. Christmas Eve and Christmas Day were days of hard work for the Express people.

**The Fox Hunt.**  
The fox hunters had a fine run on Saturday last. They came up to the that night and spent yesterday here, at the Purcell House. Mr. Hunter returned to Goldsboro but came back again last night and went down to Capt. Manning's, at Wrightsville, with the other hunters. They turned out again this morning with a full pack for another chase, the Wilmingtonians with them. It is probable that the last hunt will take place to-morrow morning. All speak in high terms of Capt. Manning's courteous attention to his guests and the delights of their visit here.

**A Bal Poudre and a Powder Ball.**  
The bal poudre at the Orton House on Friday night will be one of the most elaborate things of the kind ever known hereabouts. Not the most elaborate, though, for on December 24, 1864, Beast Butler got up a very elaborate powder ball at Fort Fisher. He must have sat up all night making his Christmas preparations, for at 4 o'clock in the morning he sent in a boat loaded with powder which he calculated to explode under the seawalls of the fort and thus blow it all to nothing. The first part of the programme was carried out successfully but the second didn't pan out worth a cent. The powder exploded and made a very pretty display of Christmas fireworks for the boys in the fort but failed to do any damage whatever. On Christmas Day there was a fearful bombardment, followed by an assault at night. The reflection from the guns, was visible here on Christmas night. But the Federals were driven off; they didn't take any Christmas egg nogg in Fort Fisher.

**St. John's Day.**

The procession will then reform and march to St. John's Hall.
