Synopsis of the Weather.
The following is a synopsis of the
weather for the 24 hours ending at
eight o'clock to-day, prepared by
the U. S. Weather Bureau:
The area of high pressure which
has prevailed over the eastern por-
tion of the country for the past few
days has broken up, allowing the
approach of warmer air from the
south. The northwestern storm
centre is gathering energy. It is
now central over Lake Superior,
with pressures of 29.4 inches. It is
causing increased cloudiness over
the entire country and rains from
the Lakes, southward to the Gulf.
It is clearing and slightly cooler in
the west, owing to the advance of
an area of moderate high, now
central over Western Texas. Con-
ditions now point to increased
cloudiness in this section to-day,
with probably showers in the
interior. Probably fair and warmer
Saturday.
