OUTLINES.

Up to the 1st inst., under the circular recently issued by the Treasury Department, the total amount of bonds purchased is \$21,422,250, and making a saving to the maturity of the loans of \$4,458,613.

National League meetings continue to be held in Ireland, notwithstanding the efforts of the police to suppress them.

Mr. T. T. Seeders had the misfortune to lose his little daughter Florence, aged ten years, who had a congestive chill and died suddenly yesterday.

We regret to announce the death of little Eugene, son of Mr. John R. Turrentine, which occurred yesterday afternoon. He was not quite six years old.

We are sorry to hear of the death of William, son of Capt. D. P. High, of Columbus county. He was a cadet at the Davis School, where he died last Friday night.

Receipts of cotton yesterday 2,175 bales; same date last year 4,916 bales. Total receipts for the crop year 40,790 bales; to same time last year 17,718 bales. Increase, 23,048 bales.

A large attendance of citizens and tax-payers is especially desired at the mass meeting to be held tomorrow night at the City Hall, to receive the report of the committee relative to a stock subscription for the city to the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railroad.

The Onslow railroad people are moving. They have petitioned the Board of Aldermen for right of way in the city; and ask the County Commissioners to release to them the old plank road from Seventeenth street to the Pender county line.

The Phoenix Hose Reel Company celebrated their fifth anniversary yesterday with a parade in the afternoon and a festival at night. All the colored companies in the department took part in the parade.

The "visible knocked the props from under the taunter youths in Chicago yesterday, but produced a sweet sunny smile among the little bears of this city.

CITY AFFAIRS.

Meeting of the Board of Aldermen—Sundry Matters Considered and Acted Upon but the Election of a Chief of Police Not Brought Up.

The Mayor announced the death of Capt. H. C. Brock, late Chief of Police, when Alderman Hall arose and in feeling terms offered appropriate resolutions which were unanimously adopted.

Aldermen King, Fishplate and Rice also spoke to the resolutions. Petition of Burr & Bailey, suggesting an amendment to the tax ordinance relating to manufacturers was discussed but no action taken.

Committee on Streets and Wharves called attention to the fact that there are many obstructions in different sections of the city—such as fences, piazzas, and even houses—which project on the streets or entirely obstruct the same, and suggested that these should be removed as early as possible.

The matter was referred back to the Streets and Wharves Committee and City Attorney, with a request to prepare an ordinance to be submitted to the Board for its sanction.

The same committee reported having authorized the employment of an extra man as helper with the team of the Cape Fear fire engine, with the understanding that the city pay him 75 cents per day for three days' work in each week and the fire company to pay the balance of his wages.

A resolution authorizing the committee on Fire Department to purchase 1000 feet of hose for the Fire Department was adopted.

The report of the Chief of the Fire Department was received and referred to the Fire Committee.

Petition of James Walker and others, that Dock street should be opened to Seventeenth street. Approved, and referred to the Committee on Streets and Wharves for action.

Petition from the President and Directors of the Wil. Onslow and East Carolina Railroad Co., for permission to lay track on Anderson or MacRae between the W. & W. railroad and Mulberry street.

Petition for an electric light on Nutt and Red Cross streets, was referred to the Committee on Lights.

COUNTY AFFAIRS.

Proceedings of Meeting of Board of Commissioners.

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session yesterday afternoon. All the members were present.

The county treasurer submitted his monthly report, showing a balance on hand to the credit of the general fund amounting to \$2,026.46, and a balance of \$5,413.67 to the credit of the educational fund.

The register's report showed fees received from marriage licenses amounting to \$9.98 and paid over to the treasurer.

The chairman reported delinquent taxes collected amounting to \$47.94, and exhibited the treasurer's receipt for the same.

In the matter of taxes of Benj. M. Campbell, for 1881 and 1882, H. A. Bagg, referee, reported that he found upon examination that the sheriff sold the property for delinquent taxes for the years mentioned, and upon further examination, found that Anthony Campbell listed and paid the taxes for the said years, as evidenced by receipts of the sheriff.

It was therefore ordered by the Board that the tax deeds held by the county be delivered to the said Anthony Campbell or his representative, and that said deeds be declared null and void, and be cancelled by the register.

Poll taxes were ordered remitted against certain parties who were shown to be non-residents.

Licenses to retail spirituous liquors were granted to A. H. Holmes, Fred. B. Rice, Wash Moseley and J. L. Croon.

A communication was received from the President of the Wilmington, Onslow & East Carolina R. R. Co., and upon motion it was resolved to meet a committee from the company on Monday next at 2:30 p. m.

The Board of Audit and Finance met in regular session yesterday. Present: R. J. Jones, Esq., chairman, and Messrs. Wm. Calder, W. L. Gore, Jno. W. Hewitt and F. Maunder.

ATLANTIC COAST LINE.

The Luxury of Travel—Increasing Comfort for Florida Tourists—Pullman Vestibule Trains.

To meet the demand of the increasing tourist and pleasure seeking travel to Florida, and to keep pace with the luxurious hotels provided for their comfort, arrangements have been perfected for the running of Pullman vestibule trains between New York and Florida, beginning about January 1st, 1888.

These trains are so connected by means of vestibules that they constitute one continuous car, rendered flexible at the points of connection by means of folded diaphragms.

Many of the advantages of the vestibule train are obvious. It relieves the traveler, in passing from one part of the train to another, from the annoyance of the wind on the platform, caused by the rapid motion of the train, as also from the cold of the open air in winter, from the dust in summer, and from the storms at all seasons.

Trains of these cars, composed exclusively of drawing-room containing library, reading, smoking rooms and buffet, dining cars in which meals will be served en route, and sleeping cars fitted with all the comforts, conveniences and luxuries, are now being built by the Pullman Palace Car Company for this service, which will undoubtedly form the finest railway trains in the world.

The Board also concurred in the recommendation of the Committee on Markets of the Board of Aldermen in renting market stalls, etc., for the current year.

The recommendation of the Chief of Fire Department that 1,000 feet of linen hose be purchased, was concurred in.

In the matter of repairing sash, etc., in the Opera House, on motion, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the Public Buildings Committee, to have plans and specifications prepared, and advertisement to be made for separate bills for material and labor.

Two bonds of \$1,000 each, redeemed and cancelled, were burned in the presence of the Board.

The following bills were audited and approved: Bills for current expenses, \$5,889.88; note, \$12,000; interest, \$217; bonds, \$2,000.

The chair stated that there would probably be matters of importance for consideration shortly, and upon motion, the Board adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

Martin Muller was arraigned yesterday for permitting his cow to run at large. A fine of five dollars was imposed.

Jno. Waddell, colored, drunk and disorderly, was sentenced to pay a fine of twenty dollars or to serve thirty days on the chain gang.

John Murray, colored, for keeping an unlicensed dog within the city limits. The case was settled by the defendant procuring a badge.

Mary Ann Barnes, who was tried August 22nd for disorderly conduct, judgment being suspended, was again brought up, and fined twenty dollars or thirty days in the city prison.

Anna Stokes, drunk and disorderly, ten dollars.

Chas. Wessell, assault and battery, fined five dollars. Case appealed.

Col. H. A. Burr has removed to the corner of Fifth and Princess streets.

There are seven or eight applications on file for the position of Chief of Police, but the matter was not considered at the meeting of the Board of Aldermen last night.
