Export Statistics-Inflow of Gold. WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.-From the monthly statement of the Chief of the Bureau of Statistics to the Secretary of the Treasury, the excess of exports over imports of merchandise appears to have been as follows: Month ending August 31, 1877, \$3,471,652; month ending August 31, 1878, \$22,-196,220; eight months ending August 31,, 1877, \$38,951,995; eight months ending August 31,1878, \$188,501,037.

The excess of exports over imports of gold and silver (coin and bullion) appears to have been as follows: Month ending August 31,1877, \$418,-640; month ending August 31, 1878, \$320,228; eight months ending August 31, 1877, \$25,463,551; eight months ending August 31, 1878, \$621.283

Death of Bonaparte's Gardener.


Napoleon's gardener at St. Helena died on the island early last August the patriarchal age of ninety at years. Tom Evans entered the Engish Army when a lad of nineteen, and was actively engaged in the Peninsula War, losing an eye in the battle of Toulouse. After Waterloo his regiment formed the guard which accompanied the French Emperor on the Bellerophon to St. Helena, and he was employed for several years as a gardener at the Longwood House. To his dying day the veteran gossipped about Napoleon and the great wars, and his last request was that he should be buried with military honors.

A Fight with the Indians. [Washington Star, 3d.]

A dispatch from Leavenworth, Kansas, says the troops had a fight with the Indians at 4 o'clock yesterday morning, but does not name the place. Lieut. Broderick, of the 23d infantry, was wounded, and Corporal Stewart, of company I, 23d infantry, and five soldiers were killed.
