now 644,270 bales. The close on Wednesday, however, was steadier, and on Thursday there was an active movement for the advance, stimulated by firmer accounts from Liverpool, which not only caused a demand to cover contracts, but led to some operations for the rise. Early yesterday morning notices for delivery on November contracts were put out with considerable freedom and at once thrown upon the markets, with the purpose of depressing prices, but the readiness with which they were taken up gave increased bouyancy to later dealings.
