THE COTTON CROP.

Important Statement of the National Exchange, New Orleans.

[By Telegraph to the Morning Star.] NEW ORLEANS, January 13.-The state ment of the National Cotton Exchange, for the four months ending December 31st, issued to-day, shows the receipts at the de-livery ports to be 3,246,814 bales; deficit, compared with the same time last year, 200,295 bales. Overland by rail routes to mills direct, 309,078 bales, against 257,580 bales last year. Northern spinners have taken this season 1,013,918 bales, or an increase over last season of 174,901 bales. Exports to foreign ports show a decrease of 325,598 bales to Great Britain; 82,788 to France; 74,198 to the continent, and 4,133 to Canada ports. Canada has taken overland 19,770 bales, against 12,109 last year. That amount of the crop of 1881-82 that has appeared in sight at the delivery ports and overland points of crossing is 3,583,684 bales, or 152,871 bales less than last year. The most important feature of the statement is the addition of 103,297 bales to the Virginia movement for the four months over and above the the aggregate returned to the local exchanges through their regu-lar daily telegraph reports. The error was occasioned by the omission of shipments at West Point.

Spirits Turpentine.

— Elizabeth City Economist: Yes-terday, at 2 p. m., the mortal remains of Hon. George W. Brooks were borne to their last resting place in the cemetery at the head of Road street. The funeral cortege was very large—the largest we ever attended in this town, and the sadness that pervaded the assemblage testified to the general sense of the great loss which the community has sustained in the death of its most distinguished citizen.

- Wadesboro Times: A little negro boy, named Bradford Blair, whose mother lived upon the place of Mr. M. A. Polk, near Polkton, was burned to death on the 18th ult. It seems that his mother had dressed him and left him by the fire in the cabin while she was at the house getting breakfast for the family. —— In the death of Dr. James A. Tillman, which unfortunate event occurred at his home on fortunate event occurred at his home on Saturday last, Anson county loses a valuable citizen, and those who knew him best a warm-hearted and generous friend.

—Maj. Dowd has introduced a bill in the House to build a court house and post office at Charlotte, N. C. We hope the bill will pass.

— The Washington correspondent of the Augusta Chronicle says: "Senator Vance, of North Carolina, has no hopes of a tariff reform, and considers the commis sion project a mere pretext for delay. There will be much discussion and rattling of dry bones all around. He says, too, that the 'dignity of the Senate' chills his ardor, and that he would prefer a six year's term in the House, where he could have some fun. If he does not make humorous speeches at his desk and addressing the President, he bubbles over with merriment privately. His chief hobby now is the colored butler at his house, whose style and spike tail coat are the admiration of the neighborhood. Somebody having suggested Vance as 'the man to play Mahone in North Carolina,' the Senator replied that, in such a position, he would be like a Texas chap who killed a man and was advised by

his lawyer to fly. 



The ball worked out after a few days. It is said that the boy was sitting on a stool when the ball struck him and he was not even stunned. —On last night some parties entered the house of J. B. Noble in Sand Hill township and severely beat him, giving him three serious cuts on the head with a bush hook and left him, after pillaging the house, in an unconscious state. It was about 1 o'clock in the afternoon on Sunday before any of the neighbors learned of Mr. Noble's condition, he having lived alone for many years.

Mr. Noble is a quiet, inoffensive, lawabiding citizen and has been living a bachelor's life for over twenty years.—Pitt county news: Mr. W. B. Hellen, on the land of Mr. S. S. Quinerly, with one horse, and only nine and one-half days plowing, made 28 bales of cotton averaging 509 pounds, and at least 100 barrels of corn and 75 bushels of potatoes. Only about two acres of the cotton was picked more than one time, causing certainly a loss of several bales. Mr. Ed. Mumford, also on the land of Mr. Quinerly, made with a small blind horse 17 bales cotton averaging 516 pounds, 50 barrels corn and 75 bushels potatoes.

— Swansboro items: The dwelling house of Mr. Thomas Holland near this place was burned on the 1st day of January, at 2 o'clock P. M. Mr. H. had been confined to his room for sometime with paralysis and had to be carried out. 
