# President Mitchell.

WILKESBARRE, PA., Oct. 15 .- President Mitchell arrived here from Washington at 1:35 this morning. The Associated Press bulletins of the outcome of the Washington conference that the strike was set-tled were read to him while he was surrounded by a small army of newspaper men. He was immediately congratulated and in reply for a statement, he said :

"Your congratulations should be withheld until we see who the six representatives on the commission are. understood before I left Washington that there would be a sixth man and that he would represent labor. The whole matter will be placed before the joint meeting of the three executive boards of the anthracite region at their meeting at 10 o'clock this morning. I will wait up to see the full statement issued by Mr. Cortelyou."

In reply to the question if he would comply with the President's request that coal mining be resumed immedistely, he said he would make a more d-finite answer when he knew more about the matter.

BURGLARS ARRESTED AT LEXINGTON, KY.

One of the Two Men Confessed to the Killing of A. B. Chinn-Feeling Intense and Violence is Feared.

LEXINGTON, KY., October 15.-Earl Whitney, the young man arrested here last Saturday, charged with the murder of A. B. Chinn and with seriously wounding his son Ass, made a complete confession here to-day, admitting that he and Claude O'Brien, his pal. did the killing. Whitney said O'Brien fired the shot that killed Chinn and admitted that the shot in his knee was inflicted by Ass Chinn in the struggle that followed. He toid where the pistol was hid. The officers went to the place and found the weapon. Whitney broke down under the questions of the officers. Colonel Roger Williams, on the order of Governor B-csham, has ordered two companies of the State militia to report at their armory here to protect the two prisoners. The feeling against the men is intense and violence is feared. The sheriff has sworn in thirty deputies. LEXINGTON, KY., Oct. 15.-Earl Whitney and Claude O'Brien were landed in the county jail here at 9:30 o'clock to-night.

# **Expected Conferences**.

The progress made to-day was accomplished by means chiefly of two extended conferences between President Rcosevelt and John Mitchell, the president of the United Mine Workers of America. we will have warehouses here, also stemmeries and prizeries and plenty of At the conclusion of the conferences

Mr. Mitchell said that he had no information which he could give to the public. It was announced, likewise, at the temporary White House, that no official statement of the conferences would be made at this time.

When the last conference had been concluded, Mr. Mitchell left the White House, and after a brief conference with President Sam'l Gompers departed for Wilkesbarre, Pa. Mr. Mitchell's visit to Washington was by invitation of President Roosevelt, who asked him to come to Washington in order that they might discuss the terms of the propositions submitted to the Presi-dent last Monday night by the anthra-

cite coal railroad presidents. While all persons having knowledge of the details of the conference are extremely reticent, enough is known to justify the statement that while they did not accomplish a settlement of the strike they at the same time were not

barren of tangible results.

#### A Counter Proposition. At the conclusion of the first conference Mr. Mitchell walked over to the Treasury Department, where for two hours he remained closeted with Frank P. Sargent, commissioner of immigration, in the latter's office. It is believed that at the conclusion of this conference Mr. Mitchell had formulated a statement akin to a counter

proposition to that made by the operators. This he later presented to the President, going directly from Mr. Sargent's office to the White House at 3 o'clock for that purpose. Roosevelt to Have Free fland.

While no authorized statement of the counter-proposition could be obtained, it can be stated on excellent authority that Mr. Mitchell, in criticism of the proposition of the operators, took exception to the disparage ment of the Miners' Union and to the limitation of the time in which, under the proposed agreement, there is to be no strike. His particular objection, however, was to the insistence of the mine owners that they should be permitted to designate the classes from which the arbitrators should be drawn by the President. It is understood that he took a firm stand against this proposition, saying he was satisfied the miners would not submit to any arbi tration which should not be arbitration in fact as well as in name.
