HAVE six varieties of STRAWBERRY plants ready for delivery, all fine, and some the very best in cultivation, measuring from 3 to 8 inches in circumference, under the proper treatment. Prices from \$1 to \$2 per hundred, and from 10 to 25 cents per dozen.

Now is the best time to plant, if the beds are trenched 18 inches or 2 feet deep, and well-enriched. The plants should be shaded for a few days with boards tacked on the South side, if they cannot be shaded, plant at any time during winter or spring.
