ROWDYISM AND MURDERS IN BALTIMORE. Our readers cannot have forgotten the horrible murder of a little boy six years old by another only two or three years his senior. Here is another case almost as bad which occurred in that city a few days ago.

A Boy Murdered.—Coroner Kelly held an inquest on Saturday night over the body of Luther Henrick, about 15 years old, who died at the residence of his parents in Comst street, near Aisquith. It appeared from the testimony before the jury, that on last Friday week, the deceased, in company with a number of associates, rallying under one of the rowdy names so prevalent at the present time, proceeded to the vicinity of the "Cattle Show," and there met with a rival gang of young boys, headed by a boy named George alias Crab Turner, who a fight arose between the two parties.

Mexico and England.—The telegraph reported advice from the city of Mexico to October 16, received at New Orleans. The British Minister has had an interview with President Arista, the object of which was reported to be to demand a final answer to certain propositions from the English Government respecting long and pending claims. It was also reported that the Minister had threatened to blockade all Mexican ports unless a satisfactory answer was given.

Before the adjournment of the late Congress the columns of the National Intelligencer, and other journals that favor a moderately protective tariff with specific duties, gave forth warnings, predicting (the writer among them) that if the revision or modification of the tariff of 1846 was postponed to another Congress, grave financial and commercial troubles would inevitably be the result.

CONDUCT OF KOSSUTH AND HIS SUITE. To the Editors of the New York Daily Times. I beg leave to enclose you the following letter, received from an Attaché in Government service travelling abroad; a gentleman of cool judgment, mature reflection, and keen observation.

Very truly yours, A. OAKLEY HALL. PARIS, Tuesday, Oct. 7, 1851. I reached Marseilles two days before Kossuth, and not only saw and conversed with him, but had an excellent opportunity of knowing and hearing a good deal of him. They are making great preparations for his reception in England, and I perceive you are doing the same in the United States, and you will therefore probably think it is very ungracious in me to say that he is a humbug and a demagogue of the first water.

One of the principal persons of Kossuth's suite is an Italian Jew, who is said to have unbending influence over him.—Yet this man comes on board with him as one of his Hungarian patriots—God save the mark!—and I suppose his wife and five children, who are also on board the frigate, are likewise Hungarian patriots. The whole number on board the Mississippi is about sixty. I have no idea that Kossuth has the least intention of visiting the United States. Indeed, I understand that he told Commodore Morgan that, as he had ascertained that the policy of the American Government was non-intervention in European affairs, there was no use in his going there.

I am rejoiced that he first visits England, in order that John Bull may first show off in the ridiculous pageant of his reception, and that the American people may not be the only fools on the occasion, another nation sharing in the ridicule. I have none, although I acknowledge but faint hopes that his recent letters and proceedings, which strongly exhibit his true character and vain-glory, joined as it probably will be with a continuance of the same game in England, may tend to open the eyes of the people in the United States. I am convinced that before he leaves England he will be properly appreciated there, and "if he goes up like a rocket" when he arrives, "he will come down like the stick."
