The height of the Pilot Mountain (says Dr. Caldwell) is 1750 feet above the level of Grassy Creek, which is the nearest stream. The view from the Pinnacle is said to be the Grandest of any other point in the Southern States, embracing Kings Mountain in York Dist., S. C., Parisss Mountain in Spartanburgh, S. C., the Table Rock in Greenville Dist., S. C., all of which are 100 miles or more distant; a full view of the Blue Ridge from North East to South West, and the Alleghany as far as the eye can reach, the Peaks of Otter, the Buffalo Lump, and many other points in Virginia. A view into four States can be had at the same time.

The ascent to the Pinnacle is now safe by steps and ladders from the House kept by the Subscriber, one and a half miles south of the Mountain.
