The United States Senate .- The Sonate of the United States charges one-third of its body every two years. At present there are 38 Democratic and 27 Opposition members, (all the latter Republicans, except Messrs. Crittenden and Kennedy.) Of the 22 whose terms will expire on the 3d of March, 1861, the places of some of them have been filled as follows: Mr. Breckinridge, in place of Mr. Crittenden, of Kentucky; Mr. Pearce, of Maryland, has been re-elected; Mr. Clark, Republican, of New Hampshire, has been re-elected; so have Mr. Foster, Republican, of Connecticut, and Mr. Harlan, Republican, of Iowa; -Mr. Pugh, Democrat, of Ohio, is to be succeeded by Mr. Chase, Republican. The following are yet to undergo the ordeal of their respective Legislatures: Mr Fitzpatrick, of Alabama; Mr. Johnson, of Arkansas; Mr. Gwin, of California; Mr. Yulee, of Florida, (declined;) Mr. Iverson, of Georgia; Mr. Fitch, of Indiana; Mr. Slidell, of Louisiana; Mr. Clingman, of North Carolina; Mr. Lane, of Oregon; Mr. Big ler, of Pennsylvania; Mr. Hammond, of South Carolina; and Mr. Green, of Missouri, Democrats. The Republicans whose terms expire are: Mr. Collamer, of Vermont; Mr. Durkee, of Wisconsin; Mr. Trumbull, of Illinois; and Mr. Seward of New York. There is a vacancy from Oregon, and there is yet some uncertainty about the result of the election in that State. The Republicans are calculating on a majority in the Senate at no distant day, but this cannot be effected, unless Indiana, Minnesota, and New Jersey should change. Mr. Bright, of Indiana, Mr. Rice, of Minnesota and Mr. Thomson, of New Jersey, hold over until 1863, Kansas, when admitted, will unquestionably send two Republican or Opposition Scuators. Rapid changes have taken place in the Senate since 1854; and the apprehensions of Mr. Millson, of Virginia, in that year, when he depicted the impolicy of the South's helping to build up free States, have been more than realized.
