THE WEAR AND TEAR OF POLITICAL LIFE. As regularly as the forests shed their leaves, a fresh crop of politicians are cut down and consigned to the farm-yard or the workshop. Multitudes who, after years of arduous labor and considerable expense, were at last able to rise as high as town constable or ward clerk, perhaps even city alderman or member of assembly, now find the ladden of promotion suddenly kicked from under their feet, and themselves tossed prone on the relentless earth. A few have worked themselves, it may be, into higher offices-have represented districts in Congress; have sat upon the judicial bench; have presided over the destinies of states for a term, or have occupied responsible situations under the general government. Three months ago they were full of confidence, tugging and jerking with all their might to influence that half-inert mass known as the popular mind, in their favor. It did move at length; but seven out of every eight aspirants were thrown on the ground and trampled under the feet of more successful rivals -themselves in turn to be hopeful, laborious, disappointed and ridden over by others who will

probably fare no better. Last spring five and twenty prominent politicians were more or less confident of being nominated for the Presidency—they had done so much for their party or their country; they were so well qualified and so favorably known; they could control such and such influences at the convention; they had hitherto been so successful, and their star was still in the ascendant. Twenty-one of those were allowed to stay at home; and three of the four who received nominations will be obliged to follow, all the worse for allowing themselves to be dragged towards such an elevation. It is probable not fewer than one hundred, persons were working for the Vice-Presidency, of whom ninety-nine will fail to reach it.

We refer to this merely as an illustration. The same expectations were formed, the same plans laid, and the same mortifications experienced in pursuit of every office within the gift of the peo-
