COTTON PRODUCTION ABROAD. From the Correspondence of the Intelligencer.

LONDON, October 25, 1860. All the evidence that has lately reached this country tends to confirm the idea that the West Indies alone can and, with encouragement and attention, will produce much more of the raw material than England can at present use. It is confidently asserted that if the West Indies are not rapidly made a cotton growing country it will not be because they lack the capacity to become such. Letters have been lately received at Man chester describing the case and certainty with which cotton can be grown, and attributing the small supply hitherto raised to the neglect of the mother country. The West India cultivators need instruction in dressing the cotton, a steady market, and a way of getting at it. Efforts are now making to form a company for growing cotton in Jamaica, and we are told that the whole

group of West India Colonies qualified for the object will be included in the scheme. The new company formed at Manchester for the purpose of providing a supply of cotton for the English market are at present, however, concentrating their activity upon India and Australia. In India labor is cheap; in Australia, we are told, the best cotton in the world is produced. In both these countries Government is ready to make grants of land and to give aid in obtaining labor, and in both countries also there is an almost positive certainty that a vast commerce would be developed as an immediate result of an effective

and steady demand by England for cotton. The new company proposes to devote nine-tenths of its capital to India and one-tenth to Australia. India affords cotton fit for many but not all purposes at 1d. per lb. on the spot, and susceptible of improvement up to a selling price in Manchester of 11d. per lb. In Australia there are vast areas (one of which is larger than France) which can produce the finest sorts, in which India is deficient. These are sufficient grounds for the choice of a field of action, but there are other motives which will be powerful with the leaders of the movement. We have seen what an extensive trade has been created by the Australian export of wool, and we are told that a much larger trade would accrue from an export of cotton. One letter says that, "with moderate skill and enterprise, India and Australia would not only take a vast amount of manufactures from us, but would so reduce the price of cotton as to enable us to get cotton and 'breadstuffs' together from America for the same that we now pay for the cotton alone. This statement supposes such an extension of the demand for cotton as would make us still customers of the United States, however much we may get from our own territories. In such a case there can be no fear for the West Indies." The proposal of the new company is that the capital shall be £100,000, and that the work shall

begin when half that amount is subscribed. Last year it is stated that only eight per cent of the cotton supply to this country came from the Queen's dominions, while four-fifths of the whole quantity came from the United States. If
