Persons berein rendered liable to military service are required to report as volunteers or conscripts, without delay, to the enrolling officers; and all who delay beyond the lat of February 1864, will be considered as having renounced the privilege of volunteering, and held for assignment according to law.

IV Enrolling officers will proceed, as rapidly as practicable, in the enrollment of persons herein made liable to military service. Previous to enrollment as

conscripts, all such persons will be allowed to volunteer, companies in service on the 16th April 1862: provided, the company chosen does not at the time of volunteering reach the maximum number allowed; and upon such company being selected the volunteer will receive from the circling officer a certificate to the effect that he has so volunteered; and no volunteer will be receiv-

ne has so volunteered; and no volunteer will be received into any company except or such certificate. Per sons who fail make their selection at the time of enrollment, will be assigned according to existing regulations.

Versons who report to the enrolling officers will be enrolled, and may be allowed a furlough of ten days before reporting to the camp of instruction.

Yankee Cruelty .- The Louisville Democrat, of the 6th instant, says that four hundred of the 115th, 117th, and 118th Indiana six months volunteers were ordered to report at Indianapolis, their term of service having expired. They were marched over the mountains from Tazewell, some of them without shoes and with but little clothing, and with a scanty supply of tood. In one party of 102 24 died before reaching camp Nelson, and 50 men died in a few hours after their arrival. them out to starve and die. Management of Transportation.—The Sumter

(S. C.) Watehman says: Some time since 20,000 bushels of corn purchased for Beauregard's arm, were shipped from Macon, Ga., on the Central Road to Savannah, and at the same time the same quantity of corn, bought for Bragg's army, was shipped on the same road from Savannah to Macon - equivalent in this one instance to the unnecessary transportation of 40,000 bushels of corn over the whole length of the road. The Quartermasters at those two points might have telegraphed or written, and exchanged bushel for bushel, and thus saved time and expense to the Government, and, what is still more important, saved that much transportation. The President of the Central, we learn, has complained of this unnecessary tax upon the road, and says it is impossible for the road to do the work required of it with such management as this. Is it any wonder, in the face of such facts, that our roads are wearing out, and that rails and rolling stock are said to be unequal to the transportation required of them?

Curious Claims .- A Paris letter says: "A curious lawsuit is on the tapis here, and I doubt if there has ever been a precedent for it before the American bar. Mr. Erlanger, the Paris bapker who engineered the Confederate cotton loan, and who, it is said, is about to make a belle rebelle, has been used by a couple of Englishmen, who claim no less than 65,000 pounds, for having introduced him to Mr. Slidell. Preposterous as the claim may seem, there is a serious legal trial to establish it now in progress Another similar case-charging commission for an introduction, is also in dispute in London.
