THE GREAT BATTLE FIELDS There are certain localities fated to furnish battle grounds in undue proportion. Whether invited by reasons of strategy, on necessitated by facts of geography, War seems to seek them as its favorite arenas.

One of these localities are the Manassas Plains. Two grand struggles have been fought there, the one July 18th 21st, 1861; the other August 29th-30th, 1862. We do not mention the many smaller encounters in the same vicinity. Spottsylvania county is another great battle

ground. Gen. Burnside fought the battle of Fredariakshura, December 1914-14th, 1862. He was succeeded by Hooker, who fought the battles of Chancellorsville, the Wilderness, &c., May 2d, 3d and 5th, 1863. Again the same neighborhood has been the scene of a tremendous struggle, the most sanguinary and protracted of all. May 5th and 6th, 1864, witnessed the great

battles of the Wilderness; May 8th, two encounters at Spottsylvania C. H.; May 10th and 12th, two great battles near the same spot, the latter the bloodiest of the war. Besides these, there was constant and heavy skirmishing attended with encounters that at another time would themselves have passed for considerable battles.

The region of the Chickahominy is another of

Mars' favorite tramping grounds. The great battles of Mechanicsville, Ellison's Mill, Gaines' Mill, Cold Harber, &c, June 26th, 27th, 1862, broke McClellan's power, and set him upon his retreat to Harrison's Landing. It was on the soil of old Hanover, that Jackson fel! upon him like a thunderbolt out of a clear sky-unexpected and irresistable. Again great armies are confronted near the spot.

There are reasons which have thus guided the

opposing warriors to these beaten fields. Manassas commands the junction of two railroads, and the great interior highways between the hostile capitals. It cannot be flanked by an army advancing on either, without difficulty; and it offers an elegible battle-ground. Spottsylvania county lies immediately across the path of an advance from the Rappahannock. The country is favorable to defensive lines, and the railroads are convenient for the transportation needed by our army. Hence, a confrontation will always be had there.

As for Richmond, devoted Richmond, it may be said to have been fought around, on almost all sides The most serious menaces, however, have come from the Chickahominy, on our north; for it is there that that stream passes nearest to us. McClellan advanced up the Peninsula; but, when he drew near, he flung his long right arm around in that direction, to gather us in his loving embrace. It was there that McDowell was to join him, and thence, doubtless, would have move from him.

The spots we have referred to, and some others which might be named, will be peculiarly the deed, en which a battle has been fought, or a patriot has died, will be dear to memory and to posterity; but the great wrestling-grounds of the war will be objects of especial interest. Manassas is long ago poetic. The Wilderness is no more associated with ideas of solitude and gloom, but awakens the proudest and tenderest recol-Acctions. Chickahominy will bear its mellifluous Indian engromen to the latest history; far more famed than when King Powhatan held his war councils on its banks, for great feats of arms in Liberty's behalf have made its name celebricus and immortal.

It is meet and proper in such a connection to pay the tribute of a notice to the beloved chief who has led our armies through nearly ail the scenes to which we have referred. On the 31st of May, 1862, General Johnston was disabled by a rifle shot on the battle-field of Seven Pines. The next day-just two years ago-Gen Lee took command. Two years! How long they seem to have been. For these two years General Lee has led the great army of Northern Virginia. No man can know until the records are uncovered, with what disproportionate means he has accounished his great achievements. He has had no controversies with his Government. He has indulged in no murmurs. "Do the best you can for me-I will do the best I can with what you give me,"-this has been the sentiment on which ie has acted. All through the great battles of the Chickahominy in 1862, the great battles of the Second Manassas, the capture of Harper's Ferry, the battles of South Mountain and Sharpsburg, the great battles of Fredricksburg and of Chancellorsville, the Pennsylvania campaign, down to he mighty engagements yet unconcluded with Gen. Grant, this unmurmuring patriot and glorious leader has fought on, labored on with unabated and untiring zeal, for his country and her cause. Even now he is in the perils of the battle, watching over his men like a father, and leading them like a hero. Is there a heart in the whole Confederacy that is not sending its aspirations to Heaven, not only for continued vitory on his arms, but for his own personal safety and happiness?

Consider, too, what a versatility of talent and f policy Gen. Lee has had opposed to him. In his two years of campaigning, he has had to study the whole catalogue of prominent Federal Generals, and adapt his own measures to their peculiar ideas. The cautious, ambitious and able McClellan, whose genius made the Army of the Potomac; the braggart Pope; the gifted MoClellan once more; the weak Burnside; the hot headed Hooker; the prudent Meade; and last, the famed Ulysses S. Grant, with the laurels won at Done! son, and at Vicksburg, wreathed around his brew. have all in succession, been sent against him, each at the head of an outnumbering army. Lee has stood at his post, and fought and baffled and defeated them all. "What surprises us," said a Yankee prisoner the other day, "what surprises us is, that Gen. Lee has never needed to be relieved. It has been Lee all the time. We have sent against him many of our Generals, but none of them have been able to out-manœuvre him. He is a great man." And well might the nau say so; and grateful should we be to the Providence which raised him up for the great occasion, and has preserved his life and his bealth .- Richmond Sentinel.
