The whole under charge of Surgeon A G Lane, (one of the most gentlemanly and energetic Surgeons in the Confederacy,) by whom the hespital was organized in the Spring of 1862. In view of the inadequacy of the accommodations of the hospitals of Richmond for the wound d, contingent up. a the possible siege of the capital, the Medical Director has directed that the number of beds in each ward of the hospital be increased one third; this will make the expacity of the entire hespital, iscluding the tents, 4,300. The hapital has been recently remodeled and repaired under the pearance. It is most healthily located, and is aupplied by a number of wells with clear, cold, pleasant water. Has a central register for the information of inquiring friends, a library for the use of patients, a bath house, and a bakery at which the whole of the bread for the hospital is baked. The 1st Division of the hospital is assigned to the accommodation of soldiers from Georgia, and the remaining five to those from North Carolida. There are now 2,129 patients in the hospital under treatment .- Richmond Whig.

A Gigantic Publishing House .- The Columbia Guardian, noticing the extensive establishment of the well known publishers, Messrs. Evans & Cogswell, says:-

"The war found these gentlemen located in Charleston, where they had gradually built up the largest printing office -except the Methodist Publishing House at Nashville-in the Southern States. Since then they have imported from Europe thirty-two printing presses, with large quantities of printing and binding materials, and seventy-four artists and printers, and now cmploy, in the various branches of their extensive business, seventy six printing presses, besides about twenty five ruling and binding machines. They employ three hundred and forty-four manes, only eighteen of whom are from the army. They have recently removed from Charleston to a new brick building, a part of which is finished, and when entirely completed, will form a hollow square, covering exactly two acres of ground and making one room 40 x 900 feet. To give some idea of extent of the work carried on by this firm, we would mention that, in addition to the large quantity of printing being done for the army, and notes and bonds for the Treasury Department, they now have in course of printing some twenty books on various subjects.'

The Tender Mercies of the Wicked .- The Vicksburg correspondent of the New York Tribune gives the following account of the condition of the negroes torn from their homes by General

"Some 3000 slaves of all ages and colors reached here yesterday. It was one of the saddest spectacles witnessed for a long time in Vicksburg. The women and children were almost starved and half naked. Such a terrible picture of abject want and squalid misery can neither be imagined nor portrayed with pen.
