AN ATROCIOUS INCIDENT. Mrs. Mary Beckham, living on the Mississippi, near Island No. 10, writes over her own name a narrative of the murder of her family by Federal negro troops. The following extract includes the

"The next day I started up the river, taking the eldest with me as a nurse. Two nights after I left, soveral white soldiers came and fired into the house, killed the watch dog, and tried to get in. My husband told them if they forced themselves in, he would shoot. They then went to the negro cabins and said to the negroes that the negro cabins and said to the negroes that there was money in the house, and they intended to have it, but fearing they might get hurt, they left and went to my father's (Daniel Watson's,) who was away from home. My mother and sister were alone. They knocked at the door and said they wanted something to eat, that they were an picket duty. Supper was brought to them on the porch, and when they got it, they said we do not want anything to eat, we want said we do not want anything to eat, we want

"They then tried to push my sister into the hall; he tried to resist them; they then drew their guns; told her if she did not give them the money which they said was buried in the cellar, they would shoot her. This she refused to do. They then went to the cellar and dug it over and returned, saving they had been misinformed, that there was no money there. They then left, which showed plainly it was money they wanted at my house. On Tuesday morning, about 9 o'clock, August 4, 1863, twelve armed negro soldiers came to the house, there being no one there except my husband, father-in-law, Benjamin Beckham, and four of my children, and some of our family negroes. They rushed on my husband and tied him, took off his watch and pin and rifled his pockets. They then tied my father-inlaw and dragged them to the river (it being about thirty yards.) They killed my husband on top of the bank by shooting him in the head. They then cut off his shoulderblade and rolled his body into the river; his clothes looked as if there had

been a great struggle. "They then took the old gentleman, stabbed him three times, once in the heart, and cut one of his cars off. After throwing his body into the river, they proceeded back to the house where two of them had been guarding my dear little children. They spoke to my eldest daughter, Laura, aged fourteen years, telling her to get up and follow her damned old daddy, at the same time presenting a pistol to her temple. The children then were driven to the water's edge, where their father and grandfather had been murdered, and then they were put to death in the most cruel

"The youngest, Richard, aged two and a half years, was thrown into the water alive. Laura jumped in and attempted to rescue him, and whilst in the water, waist deep, begging for mercy, she was knocked on the head with the butt end of a gun, entirely separating her forehead, and then stabbed in the side. Kate Ida, eleven years of age, was then disposed of. She was beston with guns until her head and shouldover. Caroline, seven years of age, was shot through the head and so disfigured that she did not look like a human. After they had murdered them all and thrown their bodies into the river, they returned to the house, taking everything valuable and all the clothing they could

"Then they started for Island No. 10, thinking or knowing they would be protected if they reached there is safety. While they were killing the children, a man by the name of Everett came up; he seked them what they meant, when they commenced firing on him and he narrowly escaped with his life; he started immediately to alarm the neighborhood."

A Handsome Affair .- The army correspondent of the Appeal, writing from Johnston's army on the 4th, gives the following account of a "handsome affair:"

This morning a handsome affair occurred on the right. Information was brought to Gen. Williams that Wilder's "Lightning" Brigade of reguar cavalry were closhing about in the swamp in his front with a view to ascertaining whether or not the dense swamp growth was inhabited by the pestiferous rebels. Old "Cerro Gordo" immediately dismounted about one hundred of his men, and moving them forward, placed them in ambush to receive the visitors. Strict silence was enjoined, and cach man stood grasping his trusty rifle and fairly itching for the opportunity to use it. Nor had they long to wait, for in a few minutes the head of the column hove in sight, floundering and splashing through the mud, bushes and mire, until they reached the end of the line, when a halt was called. The scene was ludierous in the extreme; terrible oaths, Teutcnie, Celtic and misocgenetic, were freely vented upon the d-d country, mingled with cries, Kume out of da' swamp, Jonnie Reb. Cume out, or yn gets hurta," which was received with bursts of laughter. "There's no one there. Forward," cries the valiant Colonel, and off they started; but ere they had gone many paces, their cars were greeted with a ory which always startles one, no matter whether sitting quietly at home at the "wee sma' hours," or upon the field of carnage. That cry was "fire," and the next moment about forty of those who had so lately abused mother earth, were lying calmly upon her breast, and others writhing in pain, whilst on every side their valiant comrades could be heard rushing through swamp and morass pell mell in wild confusion. The scene, it is said, rivaled the famous escapado of Tam O'Shanter. sult of this little affair was about thirty killed and fifty wounded, together with fifty Spencer rifles and about thirty horses.
