From 1882 to 1939, he was on special duty at Paris, but in 1839 he was sent to Algeria, with the commission of lieutenant colonel. There he remained for sixteen years. In 1833, at the battle of Isly, where he had the grade of colonel, he commanded the left wing of the army. In 1845 he headed an expedition against the Arab tribe of Oaled Piaha, who took refuge in a great cave. Pelissier vainly tried to get them to surrender. Finally he made a great fire of faggots at the mouth of the cave, and the five or six hundeed unfortunate wretches were suffected to death. This monstrous and unparalleled pro-

ceeding created a great sensation throughout the civilized world. Even in France it was condemnet by many, and especially Marshal Souit, then War Minister. But Marshal Bugeand, under when Pelissier was serving, declared that he acted under orders, himself assumed the responsibility, and sastified it on the ground of military necessity. The Government sustained this view, and Pelissier was promoted, reaching, in 1851, the grade of general of division, when he succoeded M. d'Hampoul in the government of Al-

geria. On receiving news of the coup d'etat he declared the province in a state of siege, and adopted the most vigorous measures to preserve order and secure adhesions to the imperial policy.

Napoleon III. was not forgetful or ungrateful

for these services, and, in January, 1855, Pelissier

was ordered to the Crimea; as second in command

to Canrobert whom he superceded in the follow-

ing May, Canrobert returning to the command of

the first division. The French operations in the

Crimes and the siege of Sebastopol were thenco-forth under the command of Pelissier, and the

final and successful assault on the formidable work

known as the Malakoff finished the portracted

siege, and brought the Russians to terms. For

this service he was made a Marshal of France,

Duke of Malakoff, and Senator, and a pension of
