There is nothing in nature so grand as the ideas

that originate in the yankee mind. The perpet-ual genesis of the sublime which illustrates the history of that extraordinary and "catawampous" people would have furnished Longinus and Burke with multitudinous and admirable illustrations. It is a pity, surely, that the advent of the yankee nation was postponed till after the exit of those philosophic writers. In any future treatise on the "Sublime," we shall never expect to find any but purely yankee examples and analogies. What for instance, could be more sublime than the favori'e yankee scheme of turning the Mississippi into the Mammoth Cave, and thus exhausting the Atlantic, whereby the boasted navy of Britain would be left to dry up on the pendulons. The nation which could conceive so magnificent and stupendous an idea is certainly capable of giving birth to analogously remarkable projects, such as setting rivers on fire, turning the earth on a new axis by means of the water power of Niagara Falls, and altogether, "beating creation hollow." From the concrete baby show to the abstract eagle striding across the continent, with one claw on the Alleghanies, and the other on the Rocky Mountains, everything yankee, whether practical or ideal, is grand and we may be permitted to say, "toploftical." In this war the yankees have done infinite oredit to their reputation, no less by the vastness of the original undertaking and the extraordinary in-strumentalities which they have employed, than by the remarkable character of the projects they have conceived, Crushing the South in the embrace of their huge military anaconda promised to be a very startling and interesting spectacle; so likewise, on a smaller scale, was the effort to turn the Mississippi, and the herculean labor of the Dutch Gap Canal; but these are trifling incidents compared with the last enterprise, which was nothing more nor less than a design to blow out the bottom of the Atlantic occan, and to let Fort Fisher drop through, very much to the amusement, no doubt, of the unsuspecting Australians. This is certainly, as the correspondent of the New York Times very justly remarks, a mighty and expeditions way of opening and clos-ing a battle, and has the merit, so pleasing to yankees, of being barren of danger to the experimenters. As may be supposed, much of the description of the recent operations before Wilmington is devoted to this marvellous enterprise. We are told how the fated vessel which was to act so pyrotechnical and explosive a part was taken from Newbern to Norfolk, and from Norfolk to Wilmington, how she was called the Louisiana, and was laden with 215 tons of gunpowder, and Commander Rhind and a select crew of aspiring yankecs; how she was brought in at the dead hour of midnight to within four hundred yards of the doomed fort; how she was anchored there, or personness corps or Teachers, the second y in Jan'y and close the fifth Tuesday in May Jonesboro'. In Morra country, SEVEN FIZED and how the ingenious and valight people then got on board of another steamer and incontinently skelleds and also a course for preparing boys. They will be hired out for Ferm labor extended addled for twelve miles, where they watched and then set en fire by her commander and crew; with keen and anticipative curiosity on the supposed margin of that perilous vortex which was to follow the marvellous explosion. So fearful, indeed, were these amiable and inquisitive people that they should miss the magnifient spectacle that, although it was not expected to come off until one o'clock, hundreds of them pased the vessels' decks from early in the evening until the moment of the stunning denouement. And the stunning denouement is thus described: At one o'clock the watch on deck reported a

bright glare in the sky, directly over the place where it was expected the explosion would occur. This glow gradually increased to a bright light, which finally expanded into a brilliant illumination. The illumination did not retain its vividness throughout its appearance, but at intervals would die down to a dull glare, thus giving one the impresson that a huge bonfire had been built and was occasionally replenished with fresh fuel. The light contained visible till fifteen minutes of two, when, as if by magic, the heavens were electrified into one vast sheet of vivid flame. This lasted but for a moment, and then the light disappeared altogether. We now breathlessly awaited the fearful shock. The immense concussion came to us in a very meek manner A deep, heavy report, not unlike that produced by the discharge of a 100 pounder, which communicated a slight trembling motion to the ship, greeted our cars fifteen seconds after the disappearance of the fissh of light. Thus ended the exhibition. The offifor experiment it certainly was—returned eafely to the fleet that night. The next morning, not a vestige of the Louisiana was to be reen, and the precamption is that she was blown to atoms. The effect the explosion had on Fort Fisher, or any other of the rebel works, is not known, but it is the impression throughout the fleet that it must have been slight, from the fact that the rebeis at times during the day opened their gues in a manner too lively to indicate weakness in material. And so caded the Yankoo at compt to blow the bottom from under Wilmington and to take the place by a grand coup de theatre.
